It is true of our family - as

ing the \$50 sent. It is a simple
matter in the country "to do with-
out" while in the world outside
one must have as good and nice

as possible.

I have long wanted to write you about Delight & Ethel - They are descended from very good stock on the father's side. James W. Lynd their grand father was a highly gifted man born in Baltimore Md. son of a minister. He was elected to the state senate of Minnesota from Sibley & other counties in 1860. He was the first white man shot in the outbreak of the Lower Brule Agency in 1862. He had written a book entitled "History, Legends, Traditions, Language, and Religion of The Dakotas." He took this to "Harpers" to get it published, but they considered it too bulky - so he was busy cutting it down when he

My dear Madam:

After I had received your letter of the 27th ultimo ^{Delight} ~~the~~ Lynd sisters were seen at this office in regard to plans they have made for the summer months and it was learned that they are very anxious to accept your kind invitation to come to Cleveland. However, before a reply was addressed to you the letter of the 4th instant was received and was at once referred to our school physician with a request that he advise me what consideration should be given the request that the girls come on at once on account of Ethel's health. Below I submit for your information a copy of the physician's statement:

"I will be glad to see the Lynd girls go on a summer vacation but cannot recommend this at the present time as there is no good reason why Ethel should not remain to the end of the school year. She is not an especially robust girl; at the same time she has no actual illness nor is she debilitated."

In view of the fact that Ethel can continue with her

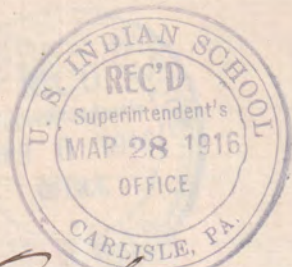

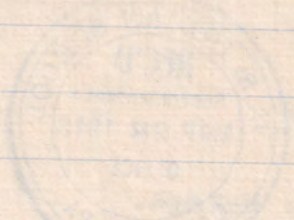

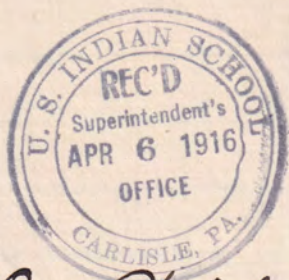

VACATION REQUEST FOR PUPIL.

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that leave of absence be granted Delight
Syrd and Ethel Syrd
 from Carlisle End of sch. year to a reasonable stay to
 enable them to visit relatives homes. We hereby agree to pay all expenses, including
 round-trip railroad fares, sleeping-car fares, meals, lodging, stage fares, telegraph and telephone messages,
 and other incidental expenses connected with the visit. We further agree that said pupil shall be
 returned to the Carlisle school on or before the last day of the leave of absence.

We further agree to deposit with the superintendent of the school sufficient money to defray all expenses to be incurred, and should the pupils, or any one of them, fail to return to school at such time as may be agreed upon by the parents or guardian and the superintendent of the school in which the pupils are enrolled, the amount of money remaining with the superintendent, necessary to the return transportation of the pupil or pupils so neglecting to return, shall be forfeited to the Government; provided, however, that in all cases where it can be shown that there were justifiable reasons for the failure of the return of the pupil the forfeiture of the funds shall not take place.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall certify to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils. If a pupil's home is not on a reservation, then the certificate of some reputable, disinterested citizen of the community may be requested as to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils.
