For and in consideration of the United States assuming the care, education, and maintenance in the United States Indian School at Carlisle Pa., of Agaves Loran, Girl, I, Mrs Mitchell Loran (Name of child.) (Sex.) (Parent, guardian, or next of kin.) of Hogansburg P. O., State of New York, do hereby voluntarily consent and agree to enrollment in said school for a period of Three years, and also obligate and bind myself to abide by all the rules and regulations for Indian schools. (Not less than 3.)

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Agnes Loran came to see me today in reference to her eyes. Upon making an examination under the mydriatic I found a very low grade of far sightedness with a low degree of astigmatism. However, as she did not seem to complain of her eyes or head, and the defect being so little, I have suggested that glasses be kept off for the present, later on if she finds the need for them I can give her the prescription. The lids are normal.

My dear Madam:

I regret very much to report to you that one day last week your daughter Agnes made a deliberate plan to leave the school room in which she was then engaged at her studies in order to meet one of the school boys in a vacant room in that same building. As near as it can be determined she spent about an hour with the boy, but both of them deny positively that any immoral act was committed while they were in the room together.

Believing that under the circumstances Agnes is not a desirable pupil and that you would prefer to have her at home where you can give her the care she should be given I would thank you to send the amount that is required to pay for her transportation. About \$12.00 will be required to pay for her transportation and an additional amount of not less than \$1.00 should be sent to pay for necessary expenses en-route home.
