SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.





My dear Mr. Norris:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 7th instant, with which you enclosed a check in the amount of \$20.00 for Lucinda Hereford to use in the purchase of necessary articles of clothing.

Noting further in your letter that Lucinda's mother desires to have the girl returned to school from her Outing home, I must call attention to the fact that for some time Lucinda has been specially favored by the lady in whose home she is staying because she has been in mourning on account of the death of her mother. For your information I submit below a copy of a self-explanatory letter that was addressed here on the 9th instant by Mrs. Campbell, the patron who is above referred to:

"I regret sincerely you had to write for a home letter from Lucinda and I promise you this matter will not again be neglected. The poor girl, as she says, has neither father nor mother and it seems an effort for her to write a home letter since her own mother passed away."

For your further information I will state that Lucinda

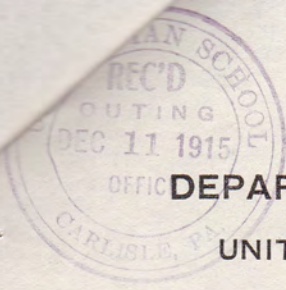
was not allowed to go to an Outing home until there was placed on file here by her mother a request that such a privilege be given her. The place with Mrs. Campbell was selected, but as soon as Lucinda arrived there she stole money and since then has made herself generally objectionable. In spite of her conduct the patron has given her every attention and has made an earnest effort to help Lucinda overcome her dirty habits and all else that makes her anything but a desirable girl to have in a home. In view of the fact that Mrs. Campbell has labored so kindly, I believe the girl should now be required to stay in the home until she has shown that she is at least partly appreciative of what has been done for her.

Will you let me hear from you again in regard to the matter?

The money she took from her country mother, amounted to \$1.50. As far as I know, she has repaid Mrs. Campbell, the whole amount.

Lucinda has many things to learn about work and about keeping herself tidy and clean and I consider her fortunate in being placed in a home with a kind hearted woman like Mrs. Campbell who is patient with her girls and yet strict and thorough in her training. She is also a devout Catholic and interests herself in the girl's religious duties.

Your daughter is in good hands and I assure you that you have no cause to worry about her welfare.

Dear Mr. Lipps:-

Mrs. Campbell of Glenside has surely been tried with Lucinda Hersford. She has been lazy and dirty and took money from a pocket book in the home - \$1.00 she took. She has refunded fifty-five cents and next week, Institute week, what she earns will have to go towards paying the balance. She missed eight out of ten spelling words and told her teacher she did not have time to study. What she was really doing was writing letters. I think we have settled her and have given her several things to think about. Poor child! She surely needs help. She had had a letter from home telling of her mother's death but Mrs. Campbell is kindness itself to her. She has a good home. I think she will do better now.

You remember the case of Katharine Varnwald's trickery to get money - really signed Mrs. Campbell's name. To-day Mrs. Campbell told me that she had taken money from her pocket book at various times. Some of it she refunded before she left - sixty-five cents I believe she returned - only a small part. She confessed to Mrs. Campbell that she took it.

She works out of school hours for her board and care and all her clothing is furnished by the government. It is not necessary for you to send her money to buy clothing. We do not want you to do this. If you wish to send her a little spending money occasionally, we would have no objections and she would appreciate it.

I am sorry to inform you that Lucinda has not been entirely honest and has taken money which did not belong to her. Perhaps it was to pay this debt that she sent to you for money. Mrs. Campbell the lady with whom your daughter lives, is a very kind woman and takes a personal interest in our girls. I feel sure she will take good care of Lucinda and help her to overcome the habit of stealing.



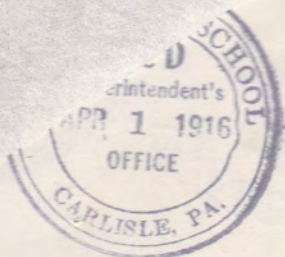
My dear Mr. DeHuff:

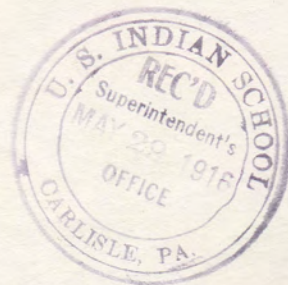

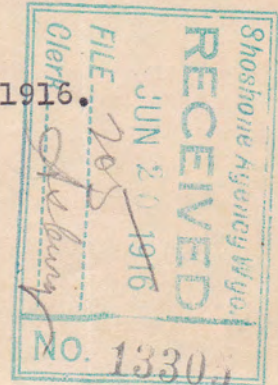
