Dear Sir:

In December, 1912 Andrew Blair, a negro living in Valentine, Nebraska made his will making as his heirs George Blair, Mary Blair and Andrew Blair. In the spring of 1913 he died leaving as his estate a tract of land on Rosebud Agency, South Dakota. The will was filed for probate in the County Court of Cherry County, Nebraska and objections were filed to the probating of the will by an old Indian woman named Medicine Red Face Woman Blair under the claim that she was the wife of Andrew Blair and entitled as his widow of a dower interest in the estate and this will sought to deprive her of this interest. It appears that this negro, Andrew Blair, went among the Sioux Indians in 1873 and lived among them until the fall of 1912 when he came to Valentine, Nebraska. In 1883 he was married under the marriage rites of the Roman Catholic Church to this Medicine Red Face Woman and they lived together as husband and wife under this marriage on Rosebud Agency for a number of years. About the year of 1888 this woman left Blair and went to Pine Ridge Agency where she took up with an Indian Man and married him under the Indian custom and by him she had two children and one of these children is still living. She never returned to Blair after deserting him in 1888. Sometime after her desertion Blair married the mother of Mary Blair, who I understand is

a member of the government school of which you are superintendent and she is the Mary Blair that is named in this will. The County Court before whom the will was filed for probate decided in favor of this Indian Woman and George Blair, a devisee in the will made an appeal to our District Court. Through some oversight George Blair made a stipulation which admits facts which discredit his contention and if this woman is to be defeated in her unjust claim it will be necessary for the matter to be taken up now at the present time in the interest of Mary Blair, an appearance will have to be made for her and her consent will have to be given for that purpose and I am writing to you with the request that you take this matter up with her and see what she wishes in the matter. I suppose that she will rely largely upon your judgment in the matter, which, of course, it will be very proper for her to do and for the purpose of advising you I will state that my contention is that by deserting Blair this Medicine Red Face Woman forfeited all rights that she might have in his estate in as much as there was at that time and always has been a custom among the Sioux to divorce each other by the mere act of desertion and it has been decided by the Supreme Court of various states that the state or federal law never was contrary to this action and in fact it has been decided that the matter of domestic relations among these Indian tribes was largely controlled by their own customs and that marriages and divorces under the tribal Indian law are recognized



SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school shall be furnished with the original of this form for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the office of the superintendent in charge of the reservation. The Reservation Superintendent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.



## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided*, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.



Your favor of the 27th inst., which is an answer to my letter of recent date regarding Mary Blair , is at hand for which I thank you. This young lady who is named on your rolls as Mary White Woman is the party I am looking for. The matter concerns an estate of Andrew Blair, deceased and she is named in the will as one of the heirs but in this will she is named as Mary Blair and not as Mary White Woman. Her mother was named White Woman . The will has been probated and there is some money to be distributed to her and the other heirs but there is one matter that requires her signature before the distribution can be made. The will was probated in the County Court of Cherry County, Nebraska and Charles H. Cornell is the Executor named in the will and is the acting qualified bonded Executor at this time. Several claims containing charges against the estate were filed in the County Court of Cherry County, Nebraska and allowed by the court. What I desire is her direction with the other heirs to this Executor Charles H. Cornell to pay out of assests of the estate the amount of the several allowed charges . 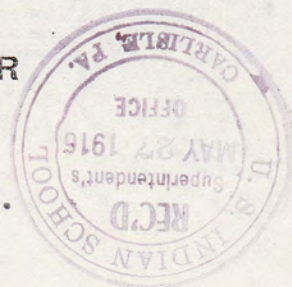


