Therefore, in view of the facts in the case, I would have to have some definite assurance from Virginia that she will put forth more earnest efforts if she is allowed to return to Carlisle. If there is any reason to believe that she will not make better use of her time than she did last year I would prefer not to re-admit her.

I have found it necessary to make it known that the time

Upon receipt of your letter of recent date, with which you enclosed me a letter from your family physician in regard to the condition of Virginia's health it was at once referred to our school physicians and our Matron with a request that the best possible attention be given her. In view of the fact that she can be given regular daily treatment here it is hoped an improvement in her condition can soon be reported to you.

It is to be regretted that I have not been more prompt in reporting to you the arrival here of the girls. As they came in just a week after the opening of school they were in time to go right ahead with their classes. When Mr. Stauffer, our Director of Music, was requested to give Virginia a chance to take piano lessons this year he reported as follows: Goolidge and yourself.

Virginia, who was at home on leave, will not be entitled to have her fare paid from Government funds until after the termination of the period for which she was originally enrolled here.
