SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

## INDORSEMENTS.

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The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided,* That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Leva Brunette has caused considerable trouble under the Acting. This trouble probably originated because of her desire to return to Carlisle after she had stated she wished to remain in the winter. She wrote some letters with false statements. In November she was transferred because her numerous complaints and falsehoods had given so much trouble. Mrs. Brosius agreed to take her and do what she could for her. Leva has not been of much value to Mrs. Brosius but I am confident Leva has gained much from Mrs. Brosius. As Leva is a Catholic and no Catholic church in vicinity, Mrs. Brosius said she would see that Leva attended her church at least once a month. They would drive her to church either in the automobile or in the carriage.

Mrs. Brosius is a good country mother and a girl ought to be proud to be mothered by a refined Christian mother as she has proven herself to be. Leva seems to be so listless and indifferent all the time. She will return to Carlisle so that she may have the influence of the school for a time and relieve Mrs. Brosius.



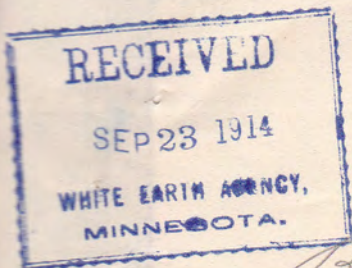


