My dear Sir:

The communication from your Dr. Rodwell which was forwarded to me with your letter of the 6th instant is being returned to you herewith. Noting in it that Susan Goodwin's sister is seriously ill and in your letter that you do not interpose any objections to her coming home now instead of in June, when her period of enrolment has terminated, it is being arranged so that the girl can leave here on Friday evening for her home. A ticket for her use to Mahanomen will be provided and she will be given a sufficient amount of cash to pay for any expenses she may have to incur enroute home.

Susan does not have any money to her credit in our school bank, and as it is always a difficult matter to effect the settlement of a claim for money advanced students to pay incidental traveling expenses it is desired that an amount of five dollars of Susan's funds be transferred here to reimburse me for the sum that will be advanced her. Her

transportation will be paid from government funds because her period of enrolment would terminate at the close of this year's work.


Sir:

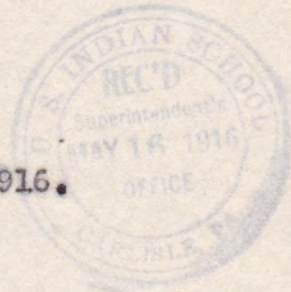
