Dear Madam:-

I have your letter relative to Edward Woods and regret that I cannot recommend his enrolment at any other Indian School. The fact that he was dismissed from this school for mis-conduct debars from from all other Indian Schools. Edward's trouble did not occur at one time. He has never shown himself thoroughly reliable. His chief trouble was in taking things which did not belong to him. He has been stealing off and on ever since he came to Carlisle. He was finally dismissed for this offense.

As I wrote you before, the best work Edward did while a pupil here, was in the Print Shop. I enclose a statement of his work from Mr. Brown. This should enable him to get work in any Print Shop and this is what Edward should do. He has also learned to play quite well on the cornet. He might be able in this way to help earn his living.

As to his tribe, I cannot give you anything definite. We have no evidence that he belongs to any tribe of Indians.

now in my home. I agreed
to give him his board
& a room until I could
hear from you. I would
like to ask about him &
his age. Mrs Chubb refuses
to have him there unless he

could be self supporting.
Now what I want to
know is what kind of
a boy he is. He does not
take hold & try to make him-
self useful but seems to
want to run round & spend
every ~~cent~~^{cent} of money at
the different shows, &
while I have seen nothing
vicious so far we are not
pleased with him. He will
do what I tell him to, but
only as just so far as I
ask. Why did he leave
the school? I will respect
your Confidence, & I would

like you to inquire

He seems to be part
Negro if we can judge
by his features & wool.

We only took him
for Charity's sake, & he
is not what was represented
to us. There is no work for
which he is fitted at this
place. I am writing this
without her knowledge &
what ever instructions
you give will be to her, as
the way I understand the
matter is ~~he~~ is still a govern-
ment ward & we take no
responsibility what ever

he is an added care, but
if he was different we would
do all in our power for him.

You know the boy is not
fit to be thrown on the
world, and there must
have been something
more than is on the surface
for him to be thrown
on his own resources
at his age.

Replying to your letter relative to Edward Wood, I have to say that he is a sort of a waif that was taken into this school in the spring of 1913 when he was 17 years of age. He claimed Indian blood but I have no way of proving this. He remained at this school until last month, when we sent him out to his guardian Mrs. Chubb. While here he learned the printer's trade and *became a pretty good workman. He also belonged to the school band and could play fairly well on the cornet.*

We sent him home because we felt that he had about reached his limit in progress and we felt that he could now earn his living by means of the trade taught him here.

My dear Mr. Francis:-

No doubt you have seen my name on your list as an ex-student of Carlisle during the years 1913-1916.

I enrolled there on March 2 1913 and left October 17, 1916. Since that time I have been working in Los Angeles, Cal., until July 26, 1917 when I enlisted in the 62 Infantry at San Francisco. I am now stationed in Camp Fremont, I am a musician

in the regimental band here and
am making rapid progress. I was
for a time, a corporal in 7 Co, 62nd
but gave up the warrant to transfer
to the band. I hope to be promoted
here before much longer.

Mr. Francis, while at Carlisle I
became acquainted with a young
lady of the Sioux tribe, Miss Mary
R. Chief, of Pine Ridge, S. Dak., but
since I left Carlisle I have not heard
from her. Is she still a student in
your school? If she is not, would
you mind giving me her present
address, if you know it? And
I would be greatly indebted to you

My regiment, while not fully equipped, will soon be shipped east and prepare to go over. We are under a most strenuous training course at present and may be for a few weeks more.
