SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



Dear Father:

I just received your letter Saturday. Am very sorry to say that I am well. The doctor said I might have heart trouble or lung trouble. And so I guess that is going to be the last of me.

The doctor said I could get some kind of medicine to cure me but it cost too much. I am not got no money to \$5 a bottle. And he said I better get to work and do something for it might be too late. And so I don't know what to do. If I only had the money I would go to work and buy medicine. It might be too late now for it was a long time since I had that pain.

I am not working no more now but still I am out in the country. I am going to tell the school up at Carlisle for they will send me back and I don't want to go back for there is too many boys there. For I might just get worse.

I am all right where I am but still I am very unhappy all the time thinking of my sisters and brothers. I am crying all the time now for I am afraid I will never get back home to see the family.

But I wish you would send me some money and I will get my picture taken and I will send it. I will do that much any how for if something happen to me you can remember by looking at my picture.

I can't tell when I might get sick for that heart trouble will take you most any time or if that lung trouble that is pretty hard to cure for only if I had money. I can't help but cry. I am crying now.

I don't sleep for I am always thinking of home but it is my own fault for fighting that old boy but I was not going to give up at him. I will fight to dead before I will let anybody pound me.

Well we all got to die sometime father so don't worry. But I only wish if I were in good health now I wouldn't care. You write soon to me. Don't you write to school for if I get worse I will tell the school just as soon so I can try to get home.

I would like to try that medicine first. I am only going to wait one week and if that pain don't go away I will do something. Write just as soon as you get this letter for I will be waiting for it. And I will write back just as soon as I get your letter. Enclosed I send my best honor and regards and wishes to all. Good By.



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

He has been concerned in a disgraceful drunken proceeding with several others and some girls and is not evidently a fit person to attend Carlisle. His case will possibly receive attention by the U. S. Grand Jury and Court. I am asking the R. R. to return you transportation ordered.

John Nunway will leave here Friday for Carlisle, returning at his own expense.


