SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.



## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

*Provided,* That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

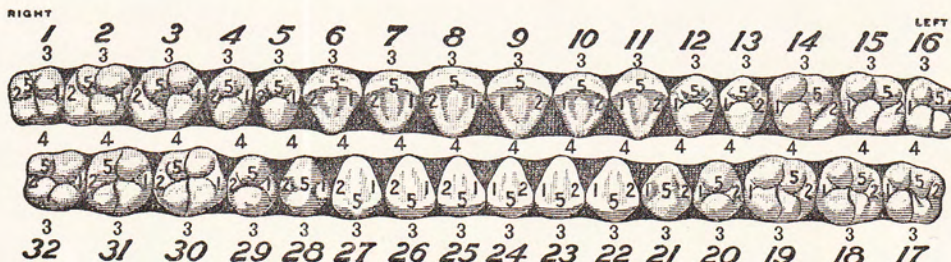

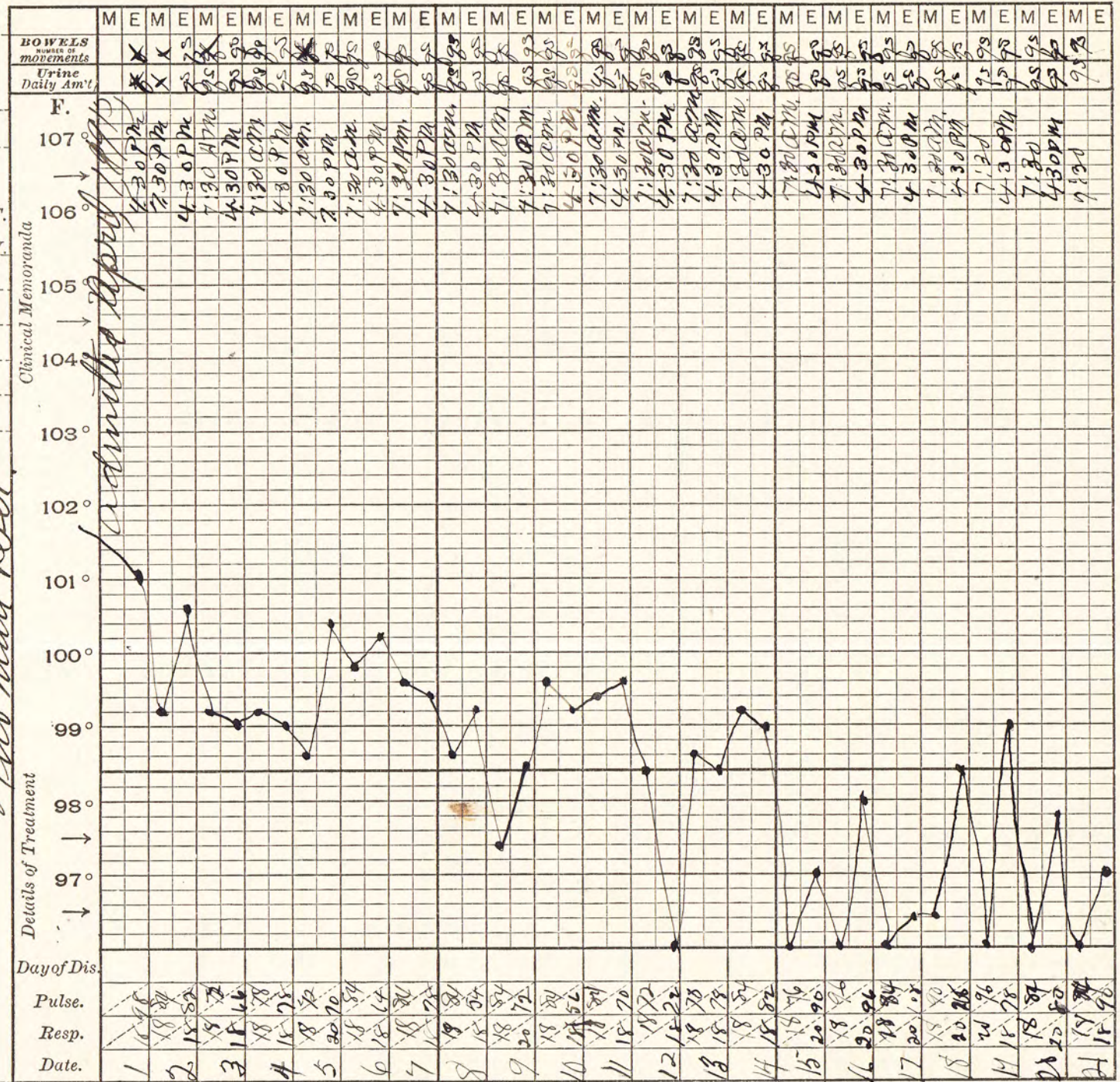

Dear Sir:

Replying to your favor of the 14th inst., relative to the returning home of Newman Deere from Carlisle, wish to say that I can arrange at any time in the near future to meet Newman in St. Louis and bring him home.

If he hasn't sufficient funds to his credit at Carlisle to pay his expenses home you can notify the Supervisor at Carlisle to let Newman make a draft on this Bank and we will honor same when presented.

If it can be so arranged I would like to have Newman leave Carlisle so he would arrive in St. Louis on Monday; by doing so I would only be away from home one week day; leaving here some Sunday on the Flyer and arriving in St. Louis early the following morning.

If arrangements can be made I would like very much to see the boy placed in some Government school in Arizona or elsewhere that you may think best, allowing him to remain home here only a short time for fear that his conditions might become worse than at this time.

Would suggest that you request Supervisor Lipps to telegraph me about two days prior to the boys leaving and on what train he will arrive in St. Louis on.



When Mr. Tidwell was at Carlisle with Mr. Ballard from your office he made a very earnest plea to have Newman Deere returned to Carlisle. The matter was again taken into consideration with our Principal Teacher, Mr. DeHuff, and as it has developed that a few of our students must be given work in Grade III this year, Newman can be accommodated too with the other students not farther advanced. When the matter was referred to our School Physician he too withdrew his objections to Newman's return here providing funds can be held available to pay for the boy's return home if it is decided later on that the climate here is detrimental to the condition of his health. It is most unusual to give such favorable consideration to a request for the return to school of a student who had to be sent away on account of ill health, but to cooperate with you the privilege to return is being given Newman and he may be sent on at once.
