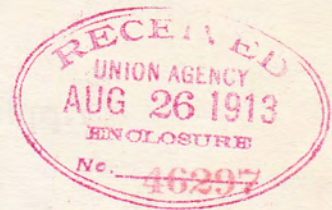

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

John stated that he still receives money direct from you, and as that is contrary to the rules of this school and the very worst you could do for your ward I again call on you not to send money to any of the students who are enrolled here except thru this office.

John is not at all a bad fellow but he is so deplorably weak and without purpose that he cannot be allowed to assume very much responsibility of any kind.

My dear Supt. Lipps:

Your kind letter of November 27 was received during my absence from home. During the past ten days, I have been down at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., with Mrs. Irvine, who was threatened with a nervous breakdown. I am glad to say that the baths and rest at that place have done her much good. I give you this word of explanation so that you will pardon me for my delay in acknowledging your letter.

I note what you say about Sealey Alexander and John Sempson. We shall very glad indeed to receive these two boys in our Academy after the Christmas vacation, on the basis of your recommendation. I herewith enclose two application blanks, which I hope you will fill out and return very soon. Each year, from twenty-five to thirty new boys enter the Academy at the opening of the winter term. The winter term will begin about the 5th of January. The tuition for a boy from that time to the end of the school year in June is \$330.00. Tuition for the full year is \$530.00. The extras are books which cost from \$8 to \$10 a year and a breakage fee of \$5 which is refundable.

The four Indian boys who are in school with us at this time are getting along in good style. We are trying to give Enus Wilson a great deal of personal attention so that he can cover the elemental work thoroughly and quickly.

Trusting that you will send the applications for these two boys very soon, and hoping this note finds all the members of your family well; also wishing you every possible blessing in your own work, I am

The mother refuses to go until her son returns home and Mr. Smith requests that John be permitted to come at once.

I am not personally acquainted with Mr. Smith but he is undoubtedly a man who stands well in the community, as he is President of the Citizens National Bank of Okmulgee, and I am quite sure that he has the best interests of his ward at heart. I therefore suggest that the boy be permitted to return home for a short time for the purpose mentioned in Mr. Smith's letter.

A copy of our school catalogue is being mailed you under a separate cover, but as it does not contain answers to all your questions I will advise that all money for John Sampson's use should be sent to me direct. It will then be placed to the boy's credit in our school bank and it can then be drawn as needed under the rules and regulations that govern the expenditure of students' money.

For the reason that John has been enrolled here for a three year period it will be to his advantage not to go home each year for a vacation. He will have an op-

Following up my letter of the 27th ultimo, I submit below for your information a copy of a letter that has been received from the Head Master of the Merceburg Academy in regard to the enrolment in that institution of John Sampson and Sealey Alexander:

Your kind letter of November 27 was received during my absence from home. During the past ten days, I have been down at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., with Mrs. Irvine, who was threatened with a nervous breakdown. I am glad to say that the baths and rest at that place have done her much good. I give you this word of explanation so that you will pardon me for my delay in acknowledging your letter.

I note what you say about Sealey Alexander and John Sampson. We shall be very glad indeed to receive these two boys in our Academy after the Christmas vacation, on the basis of your recommendation. I herewith enclose two application blanks, which I hope you will fill out and return very soon. Each year, from twenty-five to thirty new boys enter the Academy at the opening of the winter term. The winter term will begin about the 5th of January. The tuition for a boy from that time to the end of the school year in June is \$350.00. Tuition for the full year is \$550.00. The extras are

Trusting that you will send the applications for these two boys very soon, and hoping this note finds all the members of your family well; also wishing you every possible blessing in your own work, I am,

The application blanks referred to are being enclosed herewith and I would thank you to have them filled out without delay and returned here or mailed direct to Dr. Irvine with the required deposit of \$25.00 each. The boys should begin their work at Mercersburg on the opening day of the winter term on January the 5th and it will take some time before then to consider the applications for enrolment.

Sealey has a sufficient amount of money to his credit in our school bank to pay for clothing and other incidental expenses. John has but \$7.25 to his credit and an additional amount of about \$50.00 should be placed to his credit here or at the Academy with which to get him started.

I have a letter from Mr. D. M. Smith, of Okmulgee, Oklahoma, the guardian of John Sampson, a Creek boy who was recently enrolled at Mercersburg Academy, stating that John's mother has cancer in a very bad form and the attending physician says that it is absolutely necessary for her to go to a hospital to be operated upon. The mother refuses to go until her son returns home and Mr. Smith requests that John be permitted to come at once.

I am not personally acquainted with Mr. Smith but he is undoubtedly a man who stands well in the community, as he is President of the Citizens National Bank of Okmulgee, and I am quite sure that he has the best interests of his ward at heart. 

M., which I understand will get him to Okmulgee, Okla. on Saturday morning, the 29th inst.
