Dear Sir:

Your letter of April 24th, has just reached my hands, demanding an explanation concerning my conduct while out visiting Miss. Helia Edwards. I shall answer with the greatest of care and truth.

It is true I did not have permission to call on Miss Edwards, from any of the school authorities, but the young lady herself had already asked Mrs. Lippincott for her permission, and I thought that ^{only} was necessary. Permission was granted to the young lady that I might visit her before I left. So on my way back from Miss Peck, my former country home, I stopped at Phila. and went over to see Miss Edwards. And as for

as my conduct is concerned while there; Mrs. Lippincott herself can tell you all that is necessary to clear me from any suspicion of misconduct that have of me.

You need not to fear of my possession of any personal inclinations or influences. but you perhaps remember that when you was young, and a young lady asked you to pay her a visit before you was going away, you tried to please her, well that was the case with me. I do not believe that you can never prove that I have acted in any way or any where improper. especially while with this young lady. I realize that I should have asked your permission, but as I said before I did not think it necessary, and I relied and depended upon my conduct and reputation.

If you have any doubt as to my conduct while out visiting Miss Edwards, you can question both Miss Edwards, and Mr. and Mrs. Lippincott. Mr. and Mrs. Lippincott took us out for an auto. ride, the afternoon I was there.

I think I have always been trusted, and I have given you a complete explanation which I hope will clear me. Hoping that you will change your opinion,

Dear Pablo:-

I have your letter saying that for several reasons you have thought it best to give up your work at Greenville and have resigned, your resignation to take effect the last of this month. You say that you wish to enter Haskell's Commercial Department eventually. I am very glad to know that you realize the need of more education. You are still young and should spend the next three or four years in school. I would not advise you however, to go to Haskell or any other Indian school. What you should do is to get a job as soon as you leave the service and when you have earned enough money, go to some reliable Business School and work your way through it. This alone will insure your success in whatever else you take up later.

I would advise you to go to some good school in El Paso perhaps and take up the study of Spanish of which you have a good knowledge now. With a good knowledge of English and of Spanish, you should be able to get some responsible position in Mexico when the present trouble is over. As I know you, you are a man who is not afraid of hard work and I believe you would get lots more satisfaction working with something like this in view rather than remaining in the

service. There are splendid chances for young men in all new countries, where they not only make good money but where they have all kinds of opportunities for doing good. I hope you will think about this and then when you have made up your mind what to do, write me again. I am interested in you and want you to make a great success of your life. Do not get discouraged, just keep right on working no matter what happens. You have it in you to make a splendid man and some day I hope to see you in a high position. This depends entirely upon yourself.

Dear Friend:-

No doubt you will be rather surprise to hear that I intend to resign as Disciplinarian of this school on the 30th of Dec., I know you will think that I have been a failer as Disciplinarian but after you hear what I have to say you will think different.

Some how the Suprintendent and I have been havang some *trouble* of which no doubt he has already told you.

This trouble started over the Assistant Matron, she reported me to the Suprintendent, saying that she had seen me talking to certian girls out on the front porch this was true but I was only trying to settle a despute between a few of the girls. The Suprintendent did not tell me any thing about the matter, I got after the matron for going to the Suprintendent with such a matter as that.

Things went alright ~~after~~ that , but later some body either a boy or a girl, I know it was a girl wrote a not to another girl and signed my name to it, which caused much gossip, and which made me angry, so I went to the Suprintendent and told him that He himself had told Mr, Durrington that the assistant matron was very incapable and inefficient as matron. ~~So~~ when we had no matron here she was suppose to take the matrons, place but she had ask to be excuse and Mr. miller

excused her and put the seamstress as matron and then one of the teachers and ofcourse this made the rest of the employees dissatisfied.

Well this matron is always finding fault with every thing she is boys matron and I have tried in every way to please her but have failed, she is always going to ~~Mr.~~ Miller with things that do not amount to nothing.

In one instant I had punished a boy for her and I was just starting to town and needed a boy to take care of my team so I took the boy that I had just punished, and she made a big fuss about that, saying that after I had punished the boy I turned around and took him to town so ^{of} told her that even if I had to punish a boy that I was not going to keep a grudge against to the boy so she went to the Clerk inCharge and told *him* that I had taken the boys, part and had been impudent to her the Clerk instead of waiting for the Supt. to come he took it upon his hands to scold me for which it was very unjust and he had not looked into the matter in the right way, it got me mad and I told both the Superintendent and the Clerk just what I thought of them.

Mr. Lipps I have ^{been} treated very unjustly here, if you donot beleieve this you can inquire of DR. Smith McMullin of Greenville who was the attending Physician and is well known arround here, you can also ask any body out arround the school about ^{my} work here as Disciplinarian they all speak highly of me and say that I have been the only one who had any control over the boys, and that I was the only one that ever gave the students any military and physicial

training since this school has been here, I have ^{done} all in my power to put up with all that was said about me but cannot any longer, the students all like me and I like them and get along with them very well. the main trouble with me is that Mr. Miller allow the employees to tell on each other about every thing they can get to tell him that is they way they tell me that they get on the good side of him, well I do not do that I do not go to him with every thing that I hear about the other employe so that is the reason I am not on the good side of him,

I wrote to Washington asking for a transfere but they wrote and said that there was no vacant places at present, so I wrote that if I could not get another place that I would resign on the 30th of Dec.

I think that after I quit here I am going to work up at the mines near here they pay three dallors and twenty five cents it is hard work but I am not afraid to work hard.

I intend to work only until I get another place as Disciplinarian in the Indian Service for I like to be Disciplinarian. If I do not get another place then I want to go to Haskell and take a Commercial Course for one or two years I am only twenty one years old and feel that I need a lots of schooling yet because it is very hard to get along when a fellow does not know very much,

Could you help me get into Haskell to take a commercial course? Please let me if you could help me get in that school if I do not get a transfere by the 1st of April 1917.

I intend to work here at the mines until then.

I await your reply with intrest.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that--

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

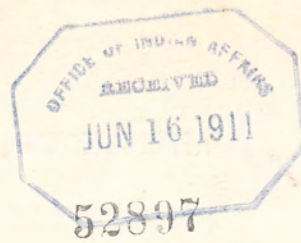

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

SUGGESTIONS FOR SUPPLYING THE INFORMATION REQUESTED ON THIS BLANK

1. The report of nonreservation school Superintendent should be made at the time or a little before the pupil leaves school, whether at the end of the school year or during the school year, provided the pupil is 18 years of age or over, or younger, if for any special reason the pupil is quitting school permanently. As soon as this report is received, or at least very soon after the pupil returns home, the Supervisor of Indian Employment will correspond with the returned student for the purpose of getting more in personal touch with him and finding out something about his wishes, etc. His answer will be attached to and filed as part of this report.

2. Health, height, and weight of returned students are sometimes very important in placing them properly; height and weight could be approximated very satisfactorily, though from the pupil records now in use all information called for in part 1 of this blank can readily be obtained and be definite.

3. The State, agency, and tribe are important, and where the pupil is not attached to any agency this fact should be stated and the Superintendent should give all available information as to the home and local conditions surrounding the pupil.

4. Where the outgoing pupil has passed the civil-service examination for any position, this fact should always be noted, giving position for which examination was taken.

5. It should be remembered that the Supervisor of Indian Employment can but seldom have a personal acquaintance with the outgoing student, and that he must depend on the information furnished in this report for his basis of action in behalf of the pupil.

6. The degree of Indian blood should always be given, as this fact largely determines how much effort will be made on behalf of any particular returned student; qualifications being equal, or nearly so, the preference will be given to those having the greatest degree of Indian blood.

7. This report should be forwarded promptly to the Supervisor of Indian Employment, Indian Office, Washington, D. C.

8. Reports on students from reservation schools should be made only as to those who leave the schools at 18 years of age, or older, and who will probably not go away to school.

9. If part 1 of this report is made out by the principal of a reservation school, the reservation Superintendent should supply information called for in part 2 if the principal is not informed as to home surroundings and local conditions. Such information is essential to a proper understanding of the difficulties and needs of the pupil.

10. When part 1 is made out by a nonreservation Superintendent, this blank will be sent by the Supervisor of Indian Employment to the Superintendent of the reservation where the outgoing student belongs. He should fill out part 2 and return the blank as promptly as possible, for practically nothing can be done until the information called for in part 2 is supplied.

Information under the heading "Employed since return as follows," will be valuable only in cases where the pupil has been home for some time.

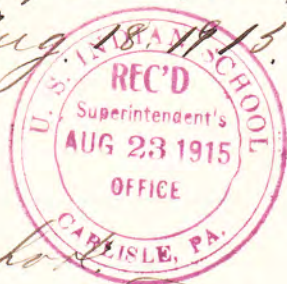

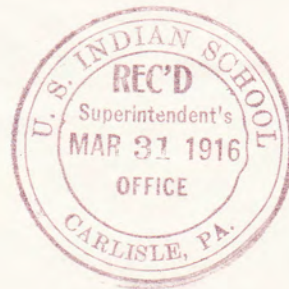

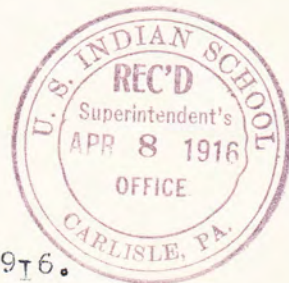
