SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

There seems to be no doubt that you are one of the boys who, on the evening of the twenty-seventh of this month, took a bee hive from the premises of Mr. Lackey, just beyond the Indian School oats field, and destroyed the contents in the oats field nearby.

It is my intention to take from the bank account of each one of you boys the sum of \$3.00 to be turned over to Mr. Lackey in payment of damages which he suffered in the loss of this bee hive.

If you have any objections to my proposed action, as above stated, you are requested to see me in person not later than ten o'clock tomorrow forenoon and state your objections.

The identity of the five boys who stole your bee hive has been fully established, and by way of punishment these boys were required to render fatigue duty last Saturday afternoon while the other boys were at leisure. In addition to this, they were refused the privilege of participating in the lawn sociable held last Saturday evening to celebrate the closing of our summer session.

The matter of reimbursement for your loss is being adjusted and part of the money will come to you in the near future. I have one thing to be determined as yet before I decide upon the amount each boy should pay, and that is that I have not been able to discover exactly who was the ring-leader in the affair. It was my intention to make him pay more than the others as soon as I find out who he is.

Mr. Gehringer:-

William Lackey, living as tenant or hired man, on left-hand side of Harrisburg pike, first farm beyond our second farm, came to see me this morning and complained of depredations committed, as he stated, by some of our Indian boys, as follows:

ITEM No. 1: Last Thursday night, they sacked one of his best peach-trees and took most of the fruit.

ITEM No. 2: Last night, while the big rain-storm was on, they took a bee-hive into a near-by oats-field, took out what they wanted, and left the rest there where they dropped in it (in the oats-field.)

Please find out, if possible, the identity of the chaps who have committed these depredations - especially the one involving the theft of the bee-hive - in order that we may administer proper punishment and also levy upon any moneys standing to their credit in order to reimburse Mr. Lackey.

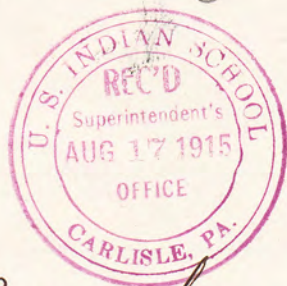


