SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

I hereby certify on honor that Lloyd Welch, who was transferred to the Carlisle Indian School, Carlisle, Pennsylvania, on September 4th, 1911, was duly examined by the Physician at this School, found in proper condition for transfer; that Mary E. Toineta, his mother, consented to such transfer, in writing; that the pupil transferred was willing and anxious for same to be done and that I believe it to be for his best self-interest.


My dear Mr. Kipps:

Since I wrote you on the 29th, I have had a talk with Lloyd Welch's step-father and he tells me that he means to look after the interests of the children and that when he has disposed of any of the property now belonging to them he will pay them what is due them.

He also tells me that their mother had about \$100. of their money deposited in the bank to her personal credit. Of course this cannot be paid until an administrator has been appointed for her estate.

The sick child, which I understand has not been dangerously ill, is improving. The children are being kept at Lonnie Toineeta's, which is a very good home.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your letter of December 26th, asking me to advise you fully as to whether in my opinion Lloyd Welch should be given permission to come home to look after the property left by his mother, I will say that from what I know of the financial condition of the family I believe that the interest of him and his brothers can be attended to without the necessity of his coming home. His mother had no surplus money on hand. His step-father and his mother owned a small amount of live stock and since his step-father is head of the family, the laws of the State of North Carolina would give this to him, however, I understand that the money used in the purchase of the improvements on the place they now hold belonged to the Welch children and we will arrange to see that they are protected in this matter.


It should also be borne in mind by the Welch children that their step-father has two small children to raise and he will need all of the available property for use in rearing these children. I have told the step-father that this school will assume the care of the two oldest children, thus they will all be provided for.

Referring to the death of Lloyd's mother I will say that she had as good attention as her husband and his family were able to give, furthermore, the school furnished her with a good bed and helped to look after her and she was given as decent burial as people of their means are able to give.

Summing up the whole matter Lloyd would do far better to save the money which would be used in making the trip to Cherokee and use it for better fitting himself to make a living when he leaves school and should he secure everything his mother had it would not help him very much.

I cannot, therefore, recomend that he be allowed to come home.

The reason of this request is that I will be financially unable to bear their expense from North Carolina to Browning.
