INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

Spear. It is as follows:

"I got your letter last night to your father and I opened it, as the old man is at Sandy River working on the road. I was up and seen Mr. Dickens and told him about your coming home and he said that it was alright that you could come if you had the money to use and I told him that you had and said that you could come as he said that he kind of promised you boys that he would recommend your coming home after your second term, so you can tell the Supt. that Mr. Dickens said that you could come home this summer. Your letter of the 24th ult. has remained unanswered thru rush of work just at the close of the year. I intended to wire immediately but the letter was covered up with several other communications and just resurrected to-day. In making up a class for Carlisle the past two years I have been careful not to make any promises in regard to vacations, always advising the pupil that their deportment and the circumstances at the time of their application would have to be considered.

The classes which I took up were rather late in arriving at Carlisle and I told each class that they need not expect to come home the following summer but if their record was good and they had the money and their Superintendent would approve I would add my recommendation the second year. Under the circumstances I feel in duty bound to support Joe's application for summer leave and as you say that his record has been good and that he has sufficient funds, there seems to be no good reason why he should not be given a vacation.
