SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mrs. Wildshoe:-

I have your letter and am glad to inform you that your daughter, Rose arrived at the school in good condition a week ago yesterday. The glands of her neck are giving her some trouble but that is nothing serious and otherwise she is in good condition.

I note what you have to say about the girl who wanted to come to Carlisle with Rose. Mr. Colgrove was perfectly right in insisting upon this girl's return to Cushman. According to the new regulations, when a pupil once enrolls at one non-reservation school, she must stay in that school until she finishes the course. She can go home for her vacations or at the expiration of the term for which she enrolled but she cannot be enrolled at another non-reservation school. This is to do away with the habit of some Indian boys and girls of wandering around from one large school to another and I think it is going to be a pretty good rule.

I hope that my daughter Rosie Wildshove has arrived safely in Carlisle, for I felt very uneasy about her on her way, and I hope that she may not get sick this winter. Rosie likes Carlisle school very well and spoke very grand about it, and we have tried to get some others to go back with her, but Colgrove wont help at all, one girl wanted to go very much with Rosie to Carlisle, she was to school last year in Cushman, and she did not like it, so Colgrove tried to force her back and refused her to Carlisle, he told her she signed, but she said she didnt, I believe the

girl because she is not of age, I asked her
uncle and aunt if they signed for Cushman
they both ~~said~~ no, they never signed nor
did they wish to let her go back to Cushman
but they both said if she wished to go
with Rosie to Carlisle it would be alright
so the girl really wanted to go with Rosie
but Colgrove strongly refused her, saying
it was too far, and I was told that Colgrove
~~said~~ that Wildshoe ~~were~~ very foolish to
send their daughter to Carlisle, it was too
far and too much expenes. you see by these
words of Colgrove he proves he dont want to
help any children to Carlisle school. so the
girl I am talking of went to the Sisters school
here at De & met, afterwards this girl told
me that the Supt. Colgrove didnt want give
her money because she did not go back to
Cushman. If we make a complaint to the
Commissioner of Indian affair, he want listen to

us Indians, but let Colgrove do as he pleases
they are some other children who wanted to
go to schools, but Colgrove wont help them
only to Cushman school he says they should
go. so they brought them to the mission school.

If Carlisle school was near here, I would send
my small children there too, and I wonder
if I am really foolish to think of this.

It is for the good of my daughter that she may
learn and see beautiful things. that we have
let her go when she wished to go to Carlisle.

I will hold you responsible, for my daughter health you take her to a town doctor in Carlisle Pa, to examine her lungs then you will find out. you say she is not sick. I know cases of Indian school children only when Indian pupil drops down helpless in sickness. then he is called sick

My daughter Rosa J. Wildshoe will pay for the doctors examination you know are I dont trust on Government doctors, neither on their medicines, she was very healthy last year. now this year she has been sick almost the time she return there.
