My dear Mr. Lipps:

We wish to report to you at this time the case of Mr. Jos. Morrin, student of the Carlisle Indian School and for some little time on the students course at the Home Office of the Ford Motor Company. Mr. Morrin has repeatedly absented himself from classes. We excused the first few times but upon his refusal to attend classes the last week he was called into the office and his case gone over by the writer. It is our aim to make the students course just as effective as possible. We aim to have the highest type men on the course and devote every effort to making it a successful line of instruction. Whenever a man voluntarily absents himself from class without a good reason it disrupts the entire organization and lowers the standard of the course. We tried to show to young Morrin the possibilities he had by going thru this course and taking further work with the Company upon completion and the opportunity he had by properly applying himself. He refused absolutely to co-operate with us and stated that the course did not mean much to him, in fact not enough to warrant his coming to classes.

In view of his disinterested attitude, he was informed by the writer that his card would be held up until he decided he would attend classes. He applied at our Employment Office this morning for a quit slip stating that he desired to quit the service of the Company. The writer signed his quit slip without further deliberation, as we feel he will not listen to any advice given him in the matter.

His home address is 52 La Belle Ave., Highland Park. He states he would like to have his money sent him. We do not know what his connection with the school is, but as far as the Company is concerned, we are at the present time a disinterested factor. We report the circumstances merely to you in order that you may further handle the case with Mr. Morrin.

INDORSEMENTS.

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.
