I am also glad that Christmas will soon be here.

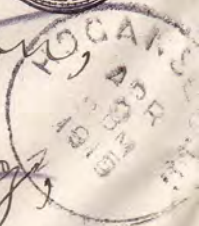

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Susan seems to cause this same trouble in every home.

Since Susan has no home of her own to which she can go when her Conlioh term is ended, I thought Mrs. Matins' home would be a desirable one for her, indefinitely. They are a nice Catholic family, located favorably. Susan however decided to return to Conlioh.







I am just in receipt of Miss Johnston's report of her visit to you and I am sorry to know that it is necessary for me to write you another letter because you have not been doing as you should. This time your trouble is not attending Church. When you are at Carlisle, you have to attend Church regularly. When you are under the Outing, we expect you to do the same. You are under the same rules when you are out just the same as if you were here. Your Church people especially are very desirous that you attend your Church duties faithfully and you should do this not only because they require it but because it is the right thing for you to do. I hope you will hereafter keep your promise to Miss Johnston to fulfil your Church duties to the very best of your ability.

You are also reported as being careless about your room and your person. A girl of your age and with the training you have had should never have such a report. You have had some good country mothers who have taught you how to take care of your room and how to keep yourself clean and tidy. You are taught these things right here at this school. Why must you be reminded again and again how to clean your room and when to take a bath ?

We have been pleased with the way our outing girls have gotten along this winter. Most of them are working hard in school and doing


