## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.*—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

## Read Instructions on this Application Blank carefully

### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Sir:

Referring to your letter of the 3rd instant with which you enclosed the communication from Lucy Red Feather I am now having returned to you herewith, this is to advise that provision has been made to pay the Hospital charges that are mentioned by Lucy from funds other than her own. It will not be necessary, therefore, to secure her pro rata share of the tribal funds for that purpose. When the amount becomes available later it will be advisable to transfer a part of it to her credit in our school bank to be used as may be required, presuming, of course, that it may be used for personal expenses while she is yet in school.


The enclosed letter from Lucy Red Feather a pupil of your school is for your information.

My dear Madam:

As our Miss Johnston has gone to her home for her annual vacation and will not return here until after the first day of the new year I am returning to you herewith the papers that were sent to Lucy Red Feather at your home for her signature.

It has been noted on the first page of the one copy in black pencil mark where Lucy is to indicate what class of Sioux Benefits she desires. If she decides to apply for cash she should so indicate. She will also have the privilege of selecting "regular benefits", which includes ~~a~~ a team of mares and some farming implements, or "heifers and cash". If the heifers and cash are selected she will receive something like \$50.00 in cash and about fifteen heifers. It is so arranged that practically the same value will be given her under any one of the three classes of benefits.

At the place on the first page marked by blue pen-

oil check mark Lucy's signature should be affixed, and on the second inside page there is marked an affidavit in blank that should be sworn to before a Notary Public by two people who are well acquainted with Lucy.

My dear Mr. Blish:

I have received your favor of the 17th instant, enclosing a letter from John Redfeather with reference to his daughter Lucy. A careful examination of the enclosure reveals the fact that the letter must have been written by Lucy herself and mailed to the father to be handed to you with a view of having you intercede so that Lucy can accomplish what she has evidently made up her mind to do now that she will soon be in a position to repay Mrs. Comfort for some of the time and attention that was given during the months she has been of practically no service at all.

For your information in the case I will have copied below a letter that was signed "John Redfeather" and a reply thereto that was written on the 15th instant after full particulars in the case had been brought to my attention:

"Will you please send Lucy Red Feather back to Carlisle because she wrote to his father and told him that she is getting tired of the country work. So his father wants him to be back at school. 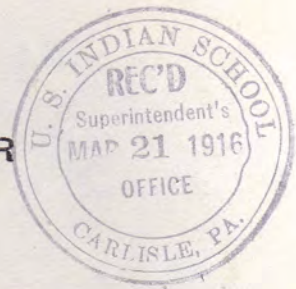

My friend:

Your father brought a letter from your Superintendent at Carlisle in regard to you to this office and makes the request that a letter be written to your school requesting Mr. Lipps to have you taken back to the school as you are discontented with your country mother.

Your superintendent says Mrs. Comfort has had your eyes treated and has cared for you when you were sick and that she feels that it is due her to have you stay awhile at least with her now that you are able to give her some assistance and in a measure return some of the kindness shown you by her.

My advice to you is take the counsel given you by the Outing Agent, Miss Johnston, and remain for the present at least with Mrs. Comfort and try to be the best you can while you stay. You must feel that there is something for you to do as well as your country mother and your superintendent and the Government. They are doing something continually for you and you must do for yourself

and be independent by earning and deserving the kindness shown you each day.

The letter from your superintendent and also a copy of this letter to you will be submitted to the Day School Inspector for further recommendations.

Dear Sir:

There is enclosed check #276 Farmers State Bank in your favor for \$25 account of Lucy Red Feather for purpose of transferring that amount of her funds to your school.

The father of Lucy has been almost a daily visitor lately, asking that something be done about Lucy and her money. He claims she has been writing him to send her money to buy clothing and that he sent her \$6 lately and he cannot spare the little he has unless it is absolutely necessary.

If, in your judgment, Lucy has proper clothing and is not in need of these funds the check may be returned for cancellation.
