SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Sir: Reference is made to your letter of July 18, 1917, (Ed-Emp 65571-17 GWB) regarding the appointment of Mr. James Holy Rable, an Indian assistant at this school, as disciplinarian and band leader in the Indian Service. I am enclosing herewith the formal application for appointment which has been prepared by Mr. Holy Magle, as well as a sealed letter which was sent in with his application. I note the requirement of a detailed statement from me setting fortile, the qualifications of Mr. Holy Eagle for a position of this kind to accompany his formal application. James Holy Eagle has a record here of being an excellent young man. He is a real Indian and shows it in his conversation and in his attitude towards life. Like most Sioux Indians her is a good worker. He is subject at times to sullen spells extending over a period of several days. He has never been held responsible at this school for the disciplining of students, and while acting as band leader here has had difficulty in controlling that organization. No heavy responsibility in discipline should be placed on James at first. He should be tried out where the responsibility is not heavy. He has netive ability as a musician and is an excellent performer on the cornet. He loves music and last Sunday gave a concert at which a march, the Carlisle Arrow; written by him was placed. James is not a trained musician in any sense. All that he knows about bands and band music has been obtained from training in the band

here, and while a capable instrumentalist his general knowledge of the responsibilities of band leadership is limited by his lack of experience. He was, however, in charge of the school band a great deal during Mr. Tyrrel's illness and until the outing party went out. Since that time he has organized a small band of ten or twelve members which has played during the summer months and does very well.

Mr. Holy Eagle has some skill as a printer and can do the mechanical part of the work. It would recommend his appointment to a position of assistant disciplinarian and band leader at a small school as a try-out, but he should have close supervision for a time.
