(28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)







Sir:

Transmitted herewith is an affidavit of Herbert W. Bloomfield, of Tullytown, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, regarding a check which he cashed for Howard Foreman, an Indian boy from this Agency, who is under the outing system from the Carlisle Indian School; together with a duplicate of the check, for your approval.

The original check was numbered 1273, drawn on the First National Bank, of Tecumseh, Oklahoma, in the amount of \$15.00, against the account No. 1086 of Howard Foreman. This check was approved and forwarded to Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School for delivery. It was dated October 25, 1915. It is presumed that the check must have been signed and endorsed by the payee, Howard Foreman, since these were the only remaining requirements to complete the check for payment. This check it appears Herbert W. Bloomfield cashed for Howard Foreman, and before he took it to his Bank he was cleaning out his desk and burned it according to his affidavit.

The duplicate check herewith is an exact copy of the original one in every way, except that the signature and endorse-

ment of the payee is lacking, however it is thought that after the approval of the issuance of the duplicate, same could be mailed to Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School, for proper delivery, since the payee is residing with Mr. Bloomfield in Pennsylvania as an outing pupil from Carlisle.

The Bank on which the original check was drawn has been notified not to honor the original check if it ever turns up, but that it should honor only the duplicate, prominently marked "DUPLICATE".

I feel satisfied that the check, the original one, has been destroyed, and recommend that the duplicate one be approved as requested.




