SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

He has settled down to more earnest work, is evidently making an effort to prove that he desires the help we can give him here and when he was seen at this office this week he declared that he will do his best to make a satisfactory record from this time on. He seems to be sincere and it cannot be necessary to add that everything possible will be done for him if he shows any willingness at all to profit by what we can do for him. Amos has created a favorable impression on me in spite of his attitude and I believe we can yet do for him what you so kindly anticipated when you urged his enrolment.

It is only fair to add that it was Frank Mars who had become intoxicated when he was at Carlisle but a very few weeks. Amos had to be reprimanded once before for going to Harrisburg without permission. He stated that other boys

Dear Mr. Lipps:

I have yours of January 26th, advising that Amos Mars is receiving his education in the guard house at your School. From your discussion of Amos' conduct no doubt this is the kind of education he needs.

I remember that you were careful about taking this boy in the first place, and that you did this upon the promises which his people made to me that he would not make any trouble, but would embrace the opportunities which were offered him.

I am very sorry to get this report about Amos, and in reply to your inquiry about his funds must advise there is nothing here in sight, and none of his folks as far as I am able to learn have any money here in the office, nor has he any himself. He is a boy right up against it and needs the thing which he is so reckless concerning. He will simply turn out to be a bum unless you folks can make something of him, and he will certainly never have another chance after he comes home from Carlisle. Put this up to your Disciplinarian, or someone and do all you can for the boy, as I know you will without any suggestion from me, -before turning him loose.

I will write him a letter too, however, I have very little hope, as this is the second unfavorable report concerning him from your School, if I remember correctly.

Amos appears to be a good fellow in many ways, but I fail to see how anything can be done for him here unless he changes very greatly his entire attitude and I would thank you to advise me whether he has any funds that could be provided him for his transportation if it is finally decided to effect his release from this school.
