SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.



Dear Mr. Friedman,

On July 23, 1912 I visited Louise Striker living with Mrs. Helen Foster of Sharon Hill, Pa. Mrs. Foster's home is a home of people of ordinary circumstances. The family consists of Mrs. Foster, her son, Mrs. Foster's father and her sister.

Louise had been with Mrs. Foster since April 10, 1912 and Mrs. Foster had found her very satisfactory. She said she had no fault to find with Louise except that she was untruthful. Mrs. Foster added - "We all tell fibs occasionally."

I found Louise's bed in a very untidy condition. There was a bed bug on the sheet and several burnt matches and accumulated dust under the sheet. I called Mrs. Foster up stairs to see the bed in the presence of Louise. Mrs. Foster was very much surprised to find such a condition showing that she had not had personal oversight of Louise's room. Louise promised that such a condition would not occur again. Mrs. Foster said she would attend to it.

Mrs. Foster liked Louise and her work and expressed the desire to have Louise remain with her for the winter.

Dear Sir:

I suppose Louise Striker reached Carlisle safely and regret that I was forced to return her to the school on such short notice also that she brought such trouble and expense into our home. Louise wrote a statement, the same regarding the poisoning of the pet dog here. This I forwarded to

you together with two other letters of
hers. If the first regarding the animal,
I have a copy. written also by her. I wrote
out, at the station, a bill contracted through
her, in which I did not include the val-
ue of the animal, as we require a dog
to watch and are forced to get one to
fill his place. The bill of which I speak
was to be shown to your daughter Louise and
she said she would have the amount
sent me. This is asking ~~very~~ little
damages and I feel will meet your
approval. Louise having but One dol-
-lar and ninety cents I was forced to
add the difference One dollar and
eighteen cts to make up her fare.
back to Carlisle. As far as I under-
stand it should be paid by herself
on her return to the school. I enclose
bill and ask that you please remit

Dear Madam:

Your letter of the 17th ultimo, relative to Louisa Striker killing your dog and the bill therefor, received.

I am very sorry, indeed, that Louisa caused you so much trouble. She is being punished here for her misconduct while with you.

Since Louise did not deliberately poison your dog, and since she is not a girl that we would place such responsibilities upon as giving medicine to a sick parent, we do not feel that she is to blame for your misfortune. Girls of her age and caliber should not have such responsibilities placed upon them. If Louisa were an older girl, and a Nurse, getting a nurse's salary, taking care of your father, and the same thing should happen to your pet dog, that would be an entirely different matter.

I am inclosing herewith the amount you advanced on her railroad fare, \$1.18, which covers her indebtedness to you.

Because I was disgracable all that day and when I drop those pills I was busy-thinking about how I acted all that day and Mrs Foster treated me as kind as ever. I was so mad at myself I didn't know what I was doing. I was going to pick them.

up but when I came back to pick them
they were gone and Shep. was lying
in the corner by the stand and he
must of pick them up because he
was the only one in the dining room
at that time, and I drop one the
Wednesday before, but I pick that-
one up and put it back in the bottle
it may be that I drop more than
one. Shep. took sick on Monday night
and he was killed on Thursday
after-noon. Mrs Foster didn't know
a thing about Shep until this
after-noon I told her about
it when she asked me about

Dear Sir:

Enclosed find bill of \$5.18 as previously rendered, covering actual expense incurred through Louise Stricker poisoning our dog, as per her own written statement which I hold. Have deducted \$1.18 carfare which you have sent me on account. If balance is not remitted I shall put this before higher authority adding value of dog.

Louise Stricker was not acting in the capacity of nurse, nor was the duty imposed on her of giving my father his medicine. She did merely as the other members of our family, if she happened to be in the dining room when he came in to his meal, she gave him a glass of water and his pill. She was treated as one of our own family as you can see from her written statement which I have turned over to you. You state that girls of her caliber should not be given such responsibilities. If you knew she was a girl of that kind, she should not be placed in any ones home as not only the animals but the people might be in danger. You say that you feel that she is not to blame for our misfortune, but that you are punishing her. If she is not to blame, why are you punishing her. She is to blame, as she admitted herself and if she says anything to the contrary she is telling an untruth, a failing of hers which needs to be corrected, she is very untruthful. Now it is not for the small amount of three dollars and ninety-five cents, that I am so determined but considering the principle of the things and your indifferent attitude together with the example to the rest of the school. It is only right that she pay the expense as the act was no accident but was done maliciously and any well regulated institution, to say nothing of a government school, would agree with me and be glad to settle it so easily. I shall not write you again but if not attended to in ten days I will see further.

Referring to the letter you sent Joe Lawe, Keshena, with regard to the plan to send his niece, Louisa Striker, to his home at the close of the present term of school, I wish to counsel strongly against this. Mrs. Lawe recently died and the burden of keeping up the home, which is located here at Keshena, would fall very heavily upon this young woman, and the surroundings would be unfit. Her mother resides on the reservation, but her home has frequently been the scene of drinking bouts which would prove a menace to the girl if she came there.

The only safe thing for Louise to do if she came to the reservation would be to leave at once to secure work outside. I imagine this can be gotten for her under your outing system with much less effort and the surroundings would be better.
