SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Acknowledging receipt of your letter of May 19th, concerning Frank Antoine, I have no particular objection to his returning home for the summer vacation.

Frank is an orphan and has no very near relatives to go to when he comes back to the Reservation. He has, however, friends with whom, I presume, he will make his home. Of course, he will be a welcome visitor to any such friends especially in view of the fact that he has a good sized bank credit. If he could be interested in remaining at Carlisle and take advantage of the summer outing system, I think it would be for his best good. Young boys with no home ties, who return to the Reservation are not apt to do very well, and for this reason if you can interest him in taking up some line of work there during the coming summer, I believe it would be the best possible thing. Of course, this would not be possible unless young Antoine agreed with the proposition, but I mention it in this connection as I believe, it would be the best thing for all concerned.

My dear Frank:

I have your letter of June 22nd, asking that you be allowed to come home for the summer vacation, and that my recommendation be sent to the Superintendent accordingly.

Your letter does not show any very good reason for wanting to return here this summer, and my records show that you have been furnished with liberal sums of money lately with which to purchase a band instrument for you and for any other incidental purposes which your Superintendent considered necessary.

As both your parents are dead, and you have no place that you can call home, I cannot see where any necessity arises for your coming back to the Reservation this summer. Mr. Obern's home, where, I believe, you boarded last year, has been sold, and you could not stay with him, even though you came back.

Odanah is not a very good town for young boys to spend a vacation in, and, unless you had some employment


to occupy your time with, your proposed vacation back to the Reservation this summer would not be of any advantage to you, insofar as I am able to see at this time.

I note that you mention the village of Washburn as being your home. It may be that you have someone over there that you can live with during the summer by paying your board, as you did last year, but, in view of all the facts, and which facts I am making known to your Superintendent by copy of this letter, I am unable to see at this time any justification for your returning to the Reservation this summer.

While it is true that a good many of the Odanah boys and girls have come back for their vacation, yet, they have parents living here and homes to go to, while your case is entirely opposite.

Unless I hear further from the Superintendent, and *he* should ~~be~~ furnish some reason for a change in my views, I think it would be best for you to forego the vacation for this year.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

Referring to your letter of June 29th, concerning Frank Antoine's request for a trip home this Summer, and my former letter of June 26th, addressed to Frank, copy of which was forwarded to you, I am now in receipt of the enclosed letter, written to me by the boy under date of June 30th.

He seems, of course, quite anxious to come home this Summer, but there does not appear to be any good and sufficient reason for granting his request; however, I do not wish to be at all arbitrary in the matter, and, as Frank has plenty of funds on hand to pay his expenses, and it might create a better spirit on his part in remaining in school upon his return another year, if you think that it is good policy to allow him to come home, I would not want to interpose any strong objection. I thought the boy might be willing to abide by the decision made in my former letter, but it is evident that he will be disappointed unless he is allowed a vacation.
