SPECIAL NOTE.

School Physician.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats.,

p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Physicians in the field should use this form to record the examination of pupils for transfer to nonreservation schools. It should

accompany the pupils' transfer blanks.

Mr. Obern's home, where, I believe, you boarded last year, has been sold, and you could not stay with him, even though you came back.

Odanah is mot a very good town for young boys to spend a vacation in, and, unless you had some employment

to occupy your time with, your proposed vacation back to the Reservation this summer would not be of any advantage to you, insofar as I am able to see at this time.

I note that you mention the village of Washburn as being your home. It may be that you have someone over there that you can live with during the summer by paying your board, as you did last year, but, in view of all the facts, and which facts I am making known to your Superintendent by copy of this letter, I am unable to see at this time any justification for your returning to the Reservation this summer.

While it is true that a good many of the Odanah boys and girls have come back for their vacation, yet, they have parents living here and homes to go to, while your case is entirely opposite.

Unless I hear further from the Superintendent, and he should be furnish some reason for a change in my views, I think it would be best for you to gorego the vacation for this year.




