INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without special permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

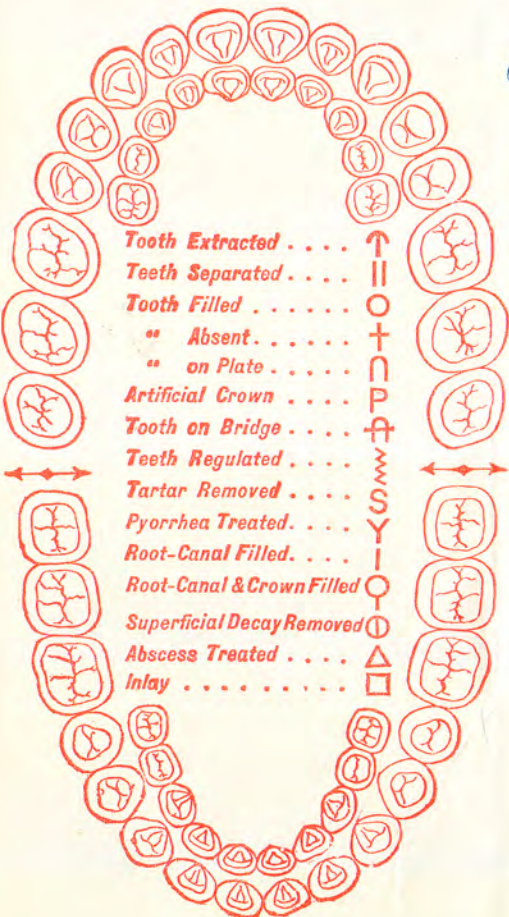

Dear Telesfor:

I have your letter of the 11th inst. asking my permission to be allowed to go to the Michigan State Automobile School located in Detroit, Michigan. I do not know anything about this school and therefore do not know what to advise you relative to going there. I do know that to enroll in an automobile school in Detroit where you have to pay your board and other expenses, is very expensive. Our boys who are working at the Ford are making good wages, some of them \$3.00 a day and others \$5.00 a day, and yet they say that it keeps them hustling to pay expenses and save what they are required to save by the school.. Are you not interested in joining one of our Ford classes? I do not think that you could make it this year as the class I understand is about made up, but if you are interested and would like to remain another year or two at Carlisle, you can try your chance with the other fellows. Mr. Bradley is trying to get another class ready to go to the Ford December 1st, 1917. I believe that before you make any further plans relative to going to this Automobile School that you would better think very carefully over what it is going to cost you. You can talk with Mr. Yates about it and then write me again.




