SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Replying to your letter of the 4th instant, the records show that Adolphus Daniel and Jackson Buzzard were enrolled at Carlisle in 1913 for a term of three years. Their terms, therefore, expire with the close of school next month. Their expenses in returning home will be paid by the school.

As these boys are 20 and 16 years of age respectively, I suggest that you re-enroll them for another period of at least three years. Carlisle is a good school, and with the experience the boys have already had there three years more would be of inestimable benefit to them. It would appear from the records of this office
that a part of the land included in said lease is incor-
rectly described, the correct description of this allot-
ment being as follows:

S2 SE SE and SE SW SE and W3 SW SE of Sec. 10;
NW NE NE of Sec. 15, T. 26, R. 21; SW SE NW
of Sec. 34, T. 23, R. 10.

The lease is made for a term of only one year,
and therefore appears to be valid, inasmuch as the regula-
tions of the Department permit the leasing of fullblood
lands, including homesteads, for a period not to exceed
one year without Departmental approval.

In regard to the adequacy of the rental recited
therein, you are advised that this matter is being taken

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up with the field clerk in whose district this land is situated, and when his report is received you will be further advised in regard thereto.

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

Dear Mr. Parker:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of the 12th ultimo, inclosing agricultural lease covering the allotment of Adolphus Daniels, with the request that the land be inspected to determine its rental value.

As per your request you are advised that the land was inspected on the 1st instant and report of the land appraiser in duplicate is herewith inclosed. You will note that the land has been appraised at \$1.25 per acre for rental value or a total of \$75.00, whereas, the lease only calls for \$35.00. We called at the home of Lee George, but he was absent and we were not able to interview him. However, the land is all in meadow and the hay has been cut and removed and we were advised by the parties living near the land that the same had been cut by Mr. George. You are further advised that Adolphus Daniels is now at his home near Afton, Oklahoma, presumably having returned home for the vacation period or because of the expiration of the term of his enrollment at Carlisle.

The matter will be taken up with him and if he has not already been paid for the land for this year, I will endeavor to collect a reasonable amount from Mr. George for him. The copy of the lease inclosed with your letter is herewith returned.
