## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

*NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.*

## **INDORSEMENTS.**

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Any general statement or wishes of patron or pupils, together with Agent's estimate of place, people, and pupil:

Julia was transferred Nov. 12<sup>th</sup> from the home of Mrs. Stoner at Waynesboro, Va. to the home of Mrs. Parker at Beverly, N.J. She had been in the Stoner home only about ten weeks. The reason for her transfer was her unsatisfactory conduct. Information came that this conduct was put forth for a purpose - she was going to act bad so she would be sent in to Carlisle.<sup>93</sup>

Mrs. Parker's home has proven to be an admirable one for Julia. I doubt if we could have selected a better one. Mrs. Parker has five daughters - no boys. This in itself is excellent for a girl of Julia's type. Mrs. Parker believes there is the making of a good woman in Julia if she can be tided over this period.

Especially she frittered away considerable time in her school work at Carlisle. She is now doing excellent work in Beverly but she should be in High School as she has done all this work before. The work is too easy for her. She already has a diploma from the eighth grade in Bradford, Wis. again, but when she came to Carlisle she was placed in Room 7 and her own in difference left her remain graded too low. At Waynesboro she entered High School but lacked interest to keep up so fell back into eighth grade again.

Now under new influences she is beginning to waken up but there is no High School convenient so at Mrs. Parker's and her teacher's suggestion she is to study two High School subjects outside of school. While she may be ahead of her class in academic work she is getting remarkable lessons in Mrs. Parker's home which I believe will more than compensate. At present she has a cold due to taking off her mits underneath her summer underwear (Feb.). She is obedient but is too swift to be thrashed. In short she is "spasmodic" in all her efforts. She is agreeable and pleasant with the family. She is learning to do some cooking, can make corn bread, make and serve hot cakes (hot) on the breakfast table.

I believe it is best considering all phases that she return to Carlisle when the spring changes are made.

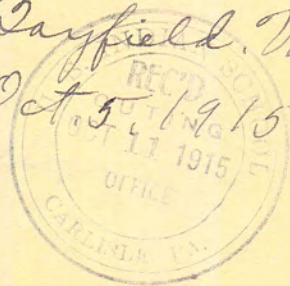

She stated that she did not acknowledge receipt of money that was sent to her by her mother several months ago and that she has probably not written home for about that long a time.

Julia was asked to write to her parents at once, which she has done, and the letter is being forwarded to Mr. Day with a copy of this communication. Julia has also been requested to write to her parents more frequently because the time must seem longer to them without her at home than to her here where there are so many activities to keep her busy.

In this connection it is only fair to add that Julia is inclined to be some indifferent and that she does not always show the proper attitude in the performance of her duties.







I have your letter of July 7th and am very much pleased to hear that you are well and trust that you are happy and content-ed.






Dear Mr. Lipps:


Dear Sir:






