NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

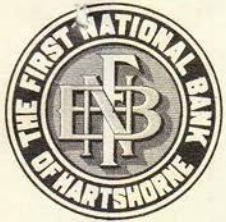

My dear Sir:

In answer to your letter of this date I will say that we have a training school here with grades from the primary to the ninth into which the young man could go. The only objection that I can see to such arrangement is that he would be with children ranging in age from 8 to 10. There would be no charge for his tuition if he wished to come to this school. The only charge would be for his boarding, four dollars a week for furnished room including boarding, light, heat and laundry.

We would permit him, if he so desired, to enter our preparatory class in the normal school. The pupils in this class are much older than those in the training school, in fact for the most part they are those whose education has been neglected. The chief objection to this plan would be that the majority of the pupils have had work corresponding to that done in 7th and 8th grades, but we have students who are below the grades mentioned. Tuition in the normal school is \$1.50 a week unless the student desires to prepare for teaching, in which case he receives free tuition.

I shall be very glad to do anything I can to help the young man along as I appreciate his situation and realize that he is a young man who needs encouragement. I take pleasure in sending you a catalogue as you request. I am also mailing the young man one. I am,

Referring to your letter of Sept. 19th, 1916, in which you enclosed blanks for proof of heirship for Edward Anderson to fill out in order to establish his claim as an heir to the estate of John and Sina Grayson, deceased, I have to advise that Edward made an attempt to fill out these blanks but his information is so meagre that he could give few reliable facts. He has brought to me an abstract which I enclose herewith which seems to indicate that the legal heirs of John and Sina Grayson have already been determined in the courts of Oklahoma. He states that there are two other heirs of John and Sina Grayson, Lizzie Hampton and Nael Anderson, brother and sister, and aunt and uncle of Edward, and that they can no doubt give any further proof needed to establish his rights.

Please have this matter given attention and advise me if there is anything further that Edward can do to establish his claim.

The enrollment records show Robert or Roberson Anderson, the grand-father of Edward Anderson, to have died prior to September 25, 1902, and therefore his name does not appear upon the approved roll of citizens of the Choc-



Gentlemen:

It has been reported to me that you have recently sent a forty dollar check direct to Edward Anderson at this school, so I beg leave to call your attention to the school rule which expressly requests that parents and guardians send money for the use of students at Carlisle only thru this office. Edward is exceptionally careful in the use of his money and in his case no harm has resulted, but it will be appreciated if the ruling mentioned above can be complied with in the future so that it can be known at all times at this office just what amounts of money come into the possession of our students.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of the 28th ultimo, enclosing lease on Departmental form, executed by Edward Anderson, lessor, in favor of L. P. Bobo, lessee, together with two copies of commercial lease executed by the said Edward Anderson as heir of Sina Grayson and Joel Anderson, in which letter you state that the leases were sent to Edward Anderson who was one of your students, in order that they may be executed, however, before same were executed you desired to make inquiries in order that you may be in a position to know whether the boys' interests are protected.

In connection therewith you are advised that the matter of the adequacy of bonus provided for in these contracts, has been taken up with the United States Oil Inspector, who reports that the land contained therein is located in what is termed wild-cat territory, and that the

property has only a nominal bonus, however, he considers in view of the high price of oil and the activity in leasing, that the lessor should be paid a bonus of at least 25¢ per acre for a lease on either of the tracts referred to in the lease.

The lease which is on Edward Anderson's own allotment, is on the form prescribed by the Secretary of the Interior, which will require the approval of the Secretary of the Interior in order to be valid; in all cases where a lease is filed for the consideration of this office, the matter of the adequacy of bonus is referred to the Oil Inspector, for investigation and should it be found that the lessor is entitled to an additional bonus, the lessee will be required to pay such amount as is deemed adequate.

As the lease contract covering the land, executed by Edward Anderson as heir, is on commercial form, it is presumed that the land contained therein is unrestricted, in which event the lease would be valid without the approval of the Secretary of the Interior.





VACATION REQUEST FOR PUPIL.

We, the undersigned, respectfully request that leave of absence be granted

Edward Anderson

from May 23rd to September 1, 1917. to

enable him to visit his home. We hereby agree to pay all expenses, including round-trip railroad fares, sleeping-car fares, meals, lodging, stage fares, telegraph and telephone messages, and other incidental expenses connected with the visit. We further agree that said pupil shall be returned to the Carlisle, Pa. school on or before the last day of the leave of absence.

We further agree to deposit with the superintendent of the school sufficient money to defray all expenses to be incurred, and should the pupils, or any one of them, fail to return to school at such time as may be agreed upon by the parents or guardian and the superintendent of the school in which the pupils are enrolled, the amount of money remaining with the superintendent, necessary to the return transportation of the pupil or pupils so neglecting to return, shall be forfeited to the Government; provided, however, that in all cases where it can be shown that there were justifiable reasons for the failure of the return of the pupil the forfeiture of the funds shall not take place.

If the pupil neglecting to return is from a reservation, the superintendent of the reservation shall certify to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils. If a pupil's home is not on a reservation, then the certificate of some reputable, disinterested citizen of the community may be requested as to the reasons for the nonreturn of the pupil or pupils.
