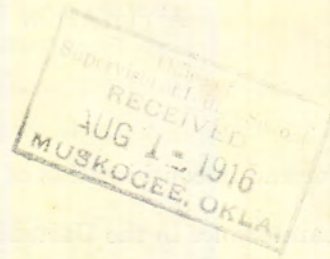

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

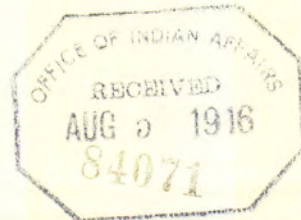
A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Perry:

Judge C. B. Basoon visited our office today and states that you have graduated at Jones Academy and that you desire to enroll in one of the larger Indian Schools. From the information gathered from Mr. Basoon my opinion is that the Indian School at Carlisle, Pa., is an ideal school for you to enter to continue your education, and therefore an application blank for enrollment in this School is enclosed.

Since you are over 21 years of age it will be necessary to get special permission from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for you to enroll in this School, and you would have to pay your railroad fare and incidental expenses in going to Carlisle, amounting in all to about \$40.00 from Muskogee. If you decide to enroll in this School you should forward the application blank to this office promptly so that we will have plenty of time to confer with the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and get his approval before School begins the first of September.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter dated September 27, 1917 relative to Jefferson Perry a pupil at this school. Our records show that Jefferson Perry enrolled at this school on the 9th of September 1916, and has been here constantly until September 17, 1917, when he left Carlisle for a short visit to his home prior to joining the Army. He was drafted.

His account shows that during the time he was a pupil at this school he received \$108.09, \$8.09 of this amount was deposited to his credit by W. M. Harrison who brought him to Carlisle, and \$100.00 was desposited by Supt. C. S. Parker. He may have received other moneys which did not come through this office.

Dear Sir:

Jefferson Perry, a 5/8ths blood Choctaw Indian, is a student at your school. When he became of age in 1914 his guardian filed a final report with the County Court here and asked to be discharged. It appears from the report that the minor was indebted to the guardian something like \$152.00, and the minor filed a receipt acknowledging this indebtedness. However, upon checking the report further I find no receipts attached for expenditures by the guardian, and there is quite a large charge for maintenance, at a time when I am inclined to believe the boy was in your school and the guardian was not maintaining the ward.

I am therefore going to ask that you kindly give me the date of Jefferson's enrollment, and the dates he has been away from your school on vacation. In other words, I want to know during what time he has been in attendance at your school.

The report has not been approved, and if I find these charges to have been improperly made against the ward I expect to file objection to the approval of the report.
