Benedict has not yet been apprehended. I will let you know if he is returned to the school.

I am sorry to knew that Benedict has made you believe that he has been unjustly treated. He was punished for an offence which to me seems very serious.

A little ever a month age, our scheel was placed under strict quarantine by the State Beard of Health because of a case of small pex. I had guards stationed at the entrances to the school grounds, who were instructed to stay at the gates, allow no one to enter or go out. Pupils and employees were ordered to stay away from the hospital where we had the case of small pex.

Benedict was given his turn as a guard. He left the gate, went outside and talked with the girls in the hospital. He not only betrayed his trust by doing this, but endangered the lives of all on the school grounds. I think his was a very serious offence, punishment for which could not be termed mistreatment.



I have been busy and therefor neglected answering your letter of the 15th ultimo, and replying thereto, will say. I am pleased that Ben can get further treatment for his eyes, because from a recent photo I noted he was much improved. I am sending \$35.00 which will allow for railway fare and two weeks board. If it should be for a longer period, let me know so I can advance the amount necessary. He has \$100, which I had hoped to turn over to him with the additional amounts as I procured them when he attains his majority, thinking it might be a nucleus on which to start him in earning his livelihood, which seems to me, better than spending it on trifles and clothes, furthermore, I do not wish to encourage him in

thinking it "easy money" and all he has to do is to ask for it, or run bills on the strength of it. The farmer who has the lease met with a painful accident in a premature explosion of dynamite. He lost a hand and one eye. He has a large family to care for and it has not been easy to pay on the lease and has asked for an extention of time.

Last fall I sent Ben a suit of clothes thinking it might serve for best and with his annuity check of \$18.50 which he must have received also helped out on his wardrobe.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.
