SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Francis:

Referring to your telegram of November 27, advising that Ada Freeman's father desires that she return home, this matter was referred to A.L. Irvine, Field Clerk at Poteau, of the district in which Mr. Freeman lives.

I have just received a letter from the Field Clerk in which he states that Mr. Freeman tells him that when he enrolled his children, Ada M., and Alexander J. Freeman, at Carlisle he was under the impression that all the time was devoted to academic work and that he prefers to have them attend a school where they have better academic advantages. He also says that his crops have been better than he expected and that he is for this reason able to meet the expenses of sending his children to school in Oklahoma and that the school near his home has recently made arrangements for more advanced grades and that his boy may attend there. The Field Clerk, in view of the conditions mentioned, believes that it will be well to permit the children to come home.

By referring to my letter of November 19,
enclosing a list of pupils of less than one-half Indian
blood and therefore unrestricted, you will notice that the
Freeman children are reported to have only 3/8 Indian blood.
Under Section 16 of the Indian School Rules and the amend-
ment thereto they are not eligible to enrollment at Carlisle
free of tuition. Pursuant to your letter of the 22nd of
November, blanks to test eligibility were sent to Mr. Freeman
but these have not been returned.

As these children are not members of the restricted
class and the Field Clerk reports that their father is finan-
cially able to meet the expenses of their education and that
their home surroundings are good, I recommend that they be
permitted to come home provided their father pays their
transportation and incidental expenses. I believe these
expenses were paid by the father at the time the children
were sent to Carlisle but if they were not the school should
be reimbursed before permitting the children to leave.

I dislike, as a general thing, to recommend the
release of children from a school where they have enrolled,
but I do not believe the Government is obligated to educate
these children in view of the report of the Field Clerk.
