SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Henderson:

Your favor of August the 18th, with which you transmitted a copy of Luzena Swayney's letter to her mother in regard to the inadequacy of the food she was receiving here, did not reach me until after Luzena had started for her home. I thank you, however, for your interest in the matter because there was no reason at all why she should have made a complaint about the food she was receiving. After her return to school from her outing home she was kept at the Hospital for the sole purpose of getting for her the best possible food.

Luzena was very much disappointed when the money promised her by her mother did not arrive here as promptly as she expected it. There was a delay of about two weeks between the time it was reported sent by her mother and the date of the delivery of the letter to me. Having been advised by Luzena that her mother had sent the money no effort was made to send her home at Government expense as could well have been arranged.

In connection with this latter statement will you kindly advise me whether Luzena's mother is in comfortable circum-

stances and whether it would seem to be a legitimate government expense to reimburse her for the amount she expended for Luzena's transportation? I enclose herewith a copy of a letter that has just been addressed to the mother.

My dear Sir:

I am inclosing herewith for your information, a copy of a letter from Luzena Swayney, a pupil of your School to her mother, Laura Swayney, Swayney, N.C. I have not seen Mrs. Swayney, the letter from Luzena having been sent to me, and I am not informed as to whether the money referred to was sent. I know, however, that if Luzena's condition warrants it you will find a way to send her home if money is not received by you.

You will notice what Luzena says in her letter about the food and I am sending this copy of her letter to you in order that the matter may be corrected before she is sent home. Such a story on her part would likely cause a number of pupils not to go to Carlisle this fall.

Dear Mother:

I am very much disappointed, because in your letter that was written the fourth, and received on the seventh, you said that you had sent money to pay my expenses home, and it has not arrived here at Carlisle yet.

If you did send it and it is lost I don't know what i'll do, because I'm going down every day, and only weigh a hundred nine and a half pounds, (109½ lbs) you know, I think, that I never lose over three pounds in the summer, and now I lost twenty and a half (20½ lbs) since the first of May. That's enough to dishearten the strongest minded person that ever lived.

I can't understand why that money has not been received. If it has been delayed two or three days, it has had ample time to get here because a week has passed since the day you wrote me that letter. If you have not sent that money, please do not tell me again that you did a thing when you did not, because I have so much faith in your word that I was going to start home today, so I told several girls. Now what will they think of me, why nothing but a somebody that does nothing but tell lies.

If you want to see me well and strong again you will have to help me to get away from here, because if I stay

here another month I'll be nothing but skin and bones,
I'm not much better than that now.

I don't think a person can live very long on bread
and butter, and it not good, and you force it down at that
and then half of the time not even that.

If you had not asked Mr. Lipps anything and let me
arranged my going away from here, you would not have to pay
my way home, as I could have got the Doctor to have me sent
away, but since you have I doubt whether I'll get to come
home or get away from here until I'm so near dead that I
will die inside of three months.

I'm so lonesome and disappointed that I have had to cry
nearly every day since I received your letter.

Well, I must close, but, please for pittys sake help
me away from here.

Will you save me some of the Baldwins, if I'm not
home in time for them, and if not all will you send them
to me. When I have fruit to eat I'm not hungry, but when
I don't I'm nearly crazy for something to eat.

Please tell me whether you sent that money by re-
gistered mail, or how you sent it. or whether at all or not.

Replying thereto I have to advise you that Luzena is not ill, but she was losing weight and it was believed best to bring her in to the school from her Outing home in order that she could enjoy a rest here while being treated for the upbuilding of her strength.

Just at this time the funds for use to pay the transportation of students have not yet been made available for use this year, so if you want your daughter to come home you will have to send her what is required for her transportation. Luzena has a small amount to her credit, and if an additional fifteen dollars can be sent arrangements will be completed to let her come home.
