SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Several weeks ago Robert Warrington came to this office to inquire whether it could be arranged so that he can take the required treatment necessary to get his teeth into such shape that they will not interfere further with his articulation. From the dentist who has been doing our school work for several years a report as follows has been secured:

Robert Warrington presents case number one, the Angle classification. The upper laterals posterior to lower incisors. Upper arch contracted with cuspid teeth forced out, causing a slight protrusion of the lips. Lower arch crowded with slight protrusion of the cuspids.

I would suggest spreading the upper and lower arch and in doing that it would cost from sixty to one hundred dollars."

Will you please have me advised whether funds could be made available to pay for having the work done and what your recommendation in the matter is?

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of the 19th instant relative to the dental work required for Robert Warrington, a Menominee student, now at your school.

There are no funds at this agency, either for Robert Warrington or for his father, and there is no immediate prospect of the latter having the funds necessary to cover the dental work in question. If there is no method by which the young man can earn the money necessary for the work, and it is deemed absolutely necessary for the preservation of his health, it might be possible for us to submit a request to the Indian Office that the money be provided from tribal funds. Whether or not this could be done would depend upon whether the Office approved and granted the necessary authority.



Dear Mr. Francis:

Referring to your letter of December 10, transmitting a request of Robert Warrington for the transfer of seventy-five dollars of his fund to your jurisdiction. I am enclosing herewith check of twenty-five dollars, for his use. It is impossible at this time to send the amount requested, for the reason that three hundred dollars was taken from Robert's account for investment in Liberty Loan Bonds, leaving his balance forty-five dollars and twenty-eight cents. It is believed the sum enclosed should be sufficient to meet the immediate needs of this pupil. The Menominee's are not well supplied with money and it is perhaps as well for Robert to attempt to get along with as little demand on home resources as possible.
