SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservations, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservations. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservations school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Sir:-

I have your letter inquiring about your daughter Louise Charlotte Caswell and am sorry to tell you that our physician has recommended that she be sent to ^asanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis as she at this time, showed very strong evidence of this disease in her system. I telegraphed Dr. Russell of the Sag and Fox Sanatorium, Toledo, Iowa, asking him if he had room for Charlotte and he replied he could take her. Since then I have had a ~~wire~~ from Charlotte's grand-father, through Superintendent Hinton, asking me to send her home. This I will do as soon as the weather gets a little warmer and the girl gets stronger, unless I hear otherwise from the grand-father and you.

Dear Sir:-

I am sorry to inform you so soon after giving you a good report about your grand daughter, Charlotte, that the school doctor now reports very unfavorably regarding her. She has developed glandular enlargements on the neck and has other symptoms pointing strongly to tuberculosis. She is in the hospital now under regular treatment and the doctor says that something else must be done for her at once.

Now I can arrange to send her to a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis cases, if you will permit me to do this. It is possible I may be able to get her in at the one located at Toledo, Iowa. She will not be so far away from her home then.

If you prefer to have her at home, it will be necessary to send more money to pay for her ticket. A ticket from Carlisle to Bemidji will cost about \$36.13. She has not spent any of the \$25 which you sent her a few weeks ago.

I would urge however that you let me arrange to send Charlotte to a sanatorium. We have a chance of saving her life by doing this and I hope you will give your permission. Please let me hear from you at once.
