I hereby certify that the statements made in the foregoing application and certificate, to the best of my knowledge and belief, are true, that the consent of Boletha Hood (Parent, guardian, or next of kin.) was voluntary, and I recommend the transfer of said child.

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Oscar is getting along nicely here and I would dislike very much to take him out of school in the middle of the school year but since his father needs him at home and you recommend his return, I will comply with your wishes and send him home upon receipt of his transportation money.

Dear Sir:-

I hand you herewith a letter which I have had handed to me this morning by Mr. R. M. Hood, who is employed in this office as Assistant Clerk.

Mr. Hood is writing on behalf of his father. Boletha Hood, who was over here last night talking matters over as to his farming operation for the coming season. I am quite well acquainted with Boletha Hood and his wife and they are among the better class of Indians here and always take an interest in farming operations and generally with considerable success. Their family is now grown and are all out doing for themselves, leaving the old people to look after themselves more or less. The old man has some good land and feels that he would like to look after it himself, something like 45 acres which should be cultivated and some 15 acres in alfalfa. Since he has not leas his land and feels that he can handle it to better advantage himself with proper help, and because of the fact that Luther, his son who has been around home for several years has now voluntered and joing the Army and another boy. Thomas, who has recently married and is arranging to work a farm for himself elsewhere, he looks to Oscar, who is there at your School and believe that it would be best to have him come home to help take up the work on the farm. Farm work begins here any time now, in fact it goes on all the time. The farmers are plowing and Mr. Hood would like to have Oscar allowed to come home to assist him.

I feel, after thinking this matter over, that this might be best for all concerned and am willing to recommend this request to you for such favorable consideration as may be in harmony with the rules of your school and best judgment. I know that Mr. Hood is in need of the help and believe that the plan outlined is as good a one as I know of at this time.

Reluctantly, I ask for this privilege because I know the value of education and do not wish to hinder my son's progress, but as one of my boys enlisted in the war and the rest have taken up independent lines of business, which leaves only my wife and I, both old aged and subject to rheumatism, in a helpless state of affairs. Part of the time I am down with rheumatism and the rest of the time I manage to wabble about doing chores

Neither my wife or I talk English and as we cannot hire Indian help, which we have tried time and again and as we cannot very well hire help, whose language is not conversant, puts us in these circumstances.

I hereby certify that the facts herein contained are substantiated by all acquainted with us and our conditions, and trusting to be favorably considered in the near future, I am,
