### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case: but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

I have been advised by Mr. Harbold of the Normal School that you have become discouraged and that you have asked for permission to return to Carlisle. Let me take this opportunity to state that you must stick now if you ever intend to acquire a better education that can be given you at Carlisle or any other Indian School. It was a special privilege that was allowed you when you went to the Normal School and to give up now would publish the fact among all your friends here and at your home that you did not have the courage to go ahead when things seemed less easy than you believed they would be.

Your chance is now and under no circumstances would I consent to your return here before the end of the term. You will have to learn the lesson some day of fighting your way in spite of difficulties and the very best time to do that is now and in the place where you are now located and where you have an opportunity to make good.

Mr. Harbold has informed me that you have been favored

by a change of roommates and that you have been relieved of some of your work. That is a consideration that very few boys at the Normal School would expect or get and is an added reason why you should stick. If you take but one subject stick to it until you make the best recitations in your class.

I write you as I do because I know it will do a great deal of harm if you give up and return to Carlisle and for the added reason that your next attempt to do semething worth while would be made doubly harder because of your giving up.

Let me hear from you so that I can offer suggestions that may be of help to you in determining anew to go ahead with the work you are doing.

Mr. Lipps:

I am attaching hereto some correspondence on the subject of Alfred Wells notorious failure at the Millersville State Normal School. As you know, in the month of March, he came to both you and me, stating that he did not consider that Carlisle offered the course of study which was in accordance with his deserts. In other words, he did not consider that it was sufficiently cultural to meet his particular needs. We, therefore, at some pains, made arrangements for him to transfer to Millersville at the beginning of the spring term. He remained there only two or three weeks when, lo and behold, without so much as "by your leave" he shows up at Carlisle. You will notice the first sentence in the second paragraph of our letter to him under date of April 14th, in which we said we could not consent to his return here before the end of the I fully intended to dismiss Alfred and send him home for disobedience of the injunction contained in that sentence, but he convinced me that he had not received this letter prior to his departure from Millersville. For that reason, I am willing to allow him to remain here pending your return.

Alfred stated to me that he was taking Arithmetic, Literature, Grammar, Geography, Algebra and Latin in Millersville; that he felt that he was doing no good; that no teacher had ever told him that he was not making good; and that he had never asked any teacher as to his standing. Our records show that for the fall and winter terms here, he got in Mathematics, 45 and 60%; Plant Study, 78 and 70; English Literature and Composition, 86 and 81. Any boy who can make such grades cannot convince me that he was failing in Millersville. It was simply a case of lying down on the job. He has not anything about him which resembles what the old Carlislers call "stick." He had the chance of a lifetime at Millersville and deliberately threw it away without asking any advice from the authorities of this school. If I were asked for a recommendation as to whether or not he should be permitted to continue here, I fear it would be an unfavorable one.

A short time ago, at my request, you sent one Hundred Dollars for the purchase of a Saxophone for Alfred Wells.

Alfred now comes to me and requests that I ask you to send him \$50. additional. It appears that a Saxophone of the type which Alfred desires to purchase will cose \$105. and a case \$12, making in all \$117. I have discussed the matter with Mr. Wheelock who informs me that a brass instrument would cost Seventy-some Dollars, a nickle plated instrument Eighty-some Dollars and a silver plated instrument, similar to those used by our band, will cost \$105; this is the kind that Alfred desires to buy. The remainder of the amount that he asks for he wished to have on deposit to meet incidental expenses from time to time.

Of course I am not acquainted with Alfred's financial condition and do not know whether he could
afford the expenditure of such a large amount of
