SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Dear Mr. Francis:

Referring to your favor of April 24th, kindly refer to copy of my letter to Mrs. Sophia M. Parker, of Hayward, Cal., dated April 10th, in relation to her son Francis Auge. I am also enclosing herewith copy of my letter written to George J. Morrison, who claims to be the father of Francis.

As near as I can find out, Francis is the illegitimate son of Sophia M. Parker, and that George J. Morrison is reputed to be the father. However, Mike Auge of Odanah, recently deceased, step-father of Francis, took care of him and acted as his guardian and caretaker before his death. He also signed the consent blank for the boy to go to Carlisle, and Mr. Morrison's interest in the boy has only lately become manifested since Francis recently came into the possession of about \$800 in money.

Morrison's scheme is to get the boy home and use this as an excuse to get hold of some of his money. Morrison has a very unsavory reputation indeed, and has done time in jails and in state institutions at least three times for repeated violations of the liquor law. He formerly kept a restaurant and sort of dive in Odanah, and sold cider that contained a certain amount of alcohol. His place was raided and he was sent to the Milwaukee reformatory for the offence. He is a whiskey Indian, and is now operating a sort of a restaurant in Odanah, which has been under observation of late, upon the supposition that drinking is going on in the establishment.

Francis should not be allowed to return to the reservation under these conditions, and any further requests of Mr. Morrison's that he do so should be promptly refused. Francis has no home to come to here, and Morrison's present interest in the boy's welfare is purely mercenary. It would be detrimental to him, and an unpardonable mistake on our part to allow Francis to come back to the surroundings that would confront him under his father's care.

Dear Sir:

Returning herewith the two letters addressed to you by your son Francis Auge, who is now attending school at Carlisle, Pa., in relation to his making a visit home this summer and return in the fall, I am also in receipt of a letter from Superintendent Francis of the Carlisle School asking for a recommendation from me in the matter of the boy's coming home.

Under date of April 2nd, I received a letter from Francis' mother, Sophia M. Parker, of Hayward, Cal., wherein she advises against Francis spending any of his present small bank credit for traveling expenses during the summer vacation. She is not very heartily in favor of the boy's leaving Carlisle this summer, and in this I agree with her.

In my reply to Mrs. Parker, the mother of Francis, I informed her of my agreement with her opinion, and also sent Superintendent Francis at Carlisle a copy of the letter, so that he might be advised as to the mo-

ther's wishes. In this connection, the mother further stated that she wanted the boy to understand that he could not make application for his funds indiscriminately and expect to have them approved, and she requests that he be advised that he must change his views in this regard, -- the sooner the better.

As I recall now, Mike Auge, step-father of Francis, signed up for the boy to enter Carlisle for three years, and as he seemed to have the custodianship of the boy after the mother left for the West, and took care of the boy before he left for the school, I presume at this time that the mother's wishes in regard to the boy's future should be respected.

I do not believe the social environment around Odansh would be very conducive to the boy's habits, and as it would be expensive for him to undertake a short visit to the reservation this summer, I hardly believe it would be good business to have him return, especially so since the mother is not in favor of this arrangement, as expressed in her recent letter to me.

Francis Auge, one of the boys we have enrolled here from your jurisdiction, came to this office several days ago with a request that permission be given him to purchase a cernet and that I recommend that funds be transferred here by you to pay for the cost of the same.

I have had inquiry made about the advisability of granting him such a privilege and have learned that it would probably be of great advantage to him to have an instrument of his own. Therefore, I refer the matter to you for such consideration as can be given it because he claims he has ample funds to his credit with you to pay for the cost of a cernet. If he has funds that might be expended for such a purpose and which are not more urgently required for any other purpose it is recommended that favorable consideration be given his request.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of April 7th, wherein you mention that a request has been made by your adopted son, Francis Auge, asking that he be allowed to use \$150 of his trust funds with which to purchase clothing and pay his car fare from Carlisle home during the coming summer.


I note the remarks contained in your letter as to the matter of the boy's spending his moderate sized present bank credit, which amounts to about \$800. I agree with you that this small sum should be conserved to the utmost, and that only such amounts as is necessary for his clothing and incidental necessities while at Carlisle should be authorized.

The boy has no home of his own at Odanah, and I think it would be quite inadvisable for him to undertake to go away out to California and visit you during the coming vacation.

As your letter seems to discourage this arrangement, I think as you do that it would better for Francis to remain in Carlisle during the vacation period and possibly take advantage of the outing system that is afforded by the Carlisle School.


