## SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

# Read Instructions on this Application Blank carefully

## INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

My dear Mr. Henderson:

Your letter of the 6th instant has been received and it has been noted under what unusual conditions the transfer to Carlisle of thirteen year old Adam Driver was effected.

Supplementing my communication of March 1st in regard to the case, I must call attention to the law relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations as follows:

"Provided, That no Indian pupil under the age of fourteen years shall be transported at Government expense to any Indian school beyond the limits of the State or Territory in which the parents of such child reside or of the adjoining State or Territory. (35 Stat. L., 781.)

In view of the provision noted above I fail to see in what other way I can aid you and it is my opinion that the mother of the boy must be asked to pay the cost of the ticket. When that is done I shall ask the Office for the special authority required to effect the enrolment of the boy at Car-

liale and will recommend that it be granted for the reason that no one else will have to be deprived of enrolment here if the boy is retained in school.

Dear Mr. Lipps:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 1, 1916 in which you say that it will be impossible for you to enroll Adam Driver the boy whom I took to Carlisle January 2<sup>d</sup>, for the reason that he was not fourteen years of age.

Conditions which caused me to take this boy to Carlisle without first submitting his application to you for approval were unusual. He had been to see me a number of times relative to getting my consent to allow him to go to Carlisle and finally brought his mother in to sign his application. Upon examining the records and from what his mother said I found him to be a little more than one month too young to pass the age requirements for enrollment in Carlisle, whereupon I told his mother that she might sign the application but that we had better submit it to you for approval before sending him to Carlisle. The mother took the boy home saying that she would keep him there

until after the party started and nothing more was seen of him until the train was starting from Cherokee when he was seen running to get the train. The Boy's earnestness appealed to me and I consented to take him with the party.

In view of the fact he was nearer his fourteenth birthday than his thirteenth, lacking only thirty five days of being fourteen and that he was well advanced for his age and in view of the further fact that his home conditions are not at all good, I believe that his application should receive very earnest consideration on the part of you and the Indian Office.

Later in the day, I again wired you as follows,-

"Superintendent Indian School Cherokee, North Carolina advises Adam Driver was born February 7, 1902 Johnson Hornbuckle born 1900. Does not give exact date."

This is to inform you that both of these boys are students of this school and were placed in a farm home with George W. Row, Yardley, Pennsylvania, where they had agreed to work for the summer. They evidently became dissatisfied and drifted into the Army. They should be returned to this school, and your cooperation in having them returned, will be appreciated.

Dear Mr. Henderson:

I have received your favor of the 25th ultimo, explaining that the approved application you recently submitted is to cover the enrolment of the Adam Driver you brought to Carlisle with your party of the 2nd of January. It is noted, however, that he was then but thirteen years of age and therefore not only ineligible to receive transportation at government expense but ineligible as well for transfer here because an older member of the same family was not enrolled at the same time as is required to comply with the Indian School Rules.

As the boy's mother is probably unable financially to pay for the ticket you provided for his use I will appreciate your making such an explanation as will justify me in asking the Office to grant such special authority as may be required to adjust the matter, if the rules now in force can be waived at all to favor the lad.

Hoping I shall hear from you soon so that settlement of


