SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

5-
Elimination of Ineligible Pupils from the Government Indian Schools.—In many of our boarding schools Indian children are being educated at Government expense whose parents are amply able to pay for their education and have public school facilities at or near their homes. Such children shall not hereafter be enrolled in Government Indian schools supported by gratuity appropriations, except on payment of actual per capita cost and transportation.

Sir:

The following case is submitted for your consideration.

On Wednesday about two o'clock in the afternoon, Mrs. McPherson, the Dining-room matron, missed Emma Williams, a full-blood Caddo Indian girl, 15 years of age from her detail in the Dining-room where she had been set at a task of scrubbing. She immediately searched for her and found her alone by the door in the basement of the Dining Hall. Other girls in the detail reported that George Horn, a Piegan Indian boy of the Blackfeet Indian reservation and a kitchen boy, had been with her there but had run out before the Dining-room matron had arrived.

The girl admitted to Mrs. Ewing, the matron, that she had improper relationship with the boy. She also admitted that prior to coming to this school, she had frequently had improper relationship with boys. George Horn first denied the charge and then admitted that he had met her, the girl, under the conditions mentioned as well as two other times at the same place and time.

Mrs. McPherson is a serious, earnest, well-meaning woman who has been employed in the position for about six months and has never been guilty to my knowledge, of neglect of duty. She has about 35 girls under her and for whom she is responsible.

Emma is a backward girl of a comparative low order of intelligence. She has heretofore born a good reputation and was not considered a bad girl at all.

I request authority to return both of these pupils to their homes immediately for the good of the school, advising both superintendents of the facts so that if deemed advisable, a marriage can be arranged in the future.

The reason for this action is that on Wednesday afternoon March 27, about two o'clock, the Dining Room matron missed Emma Williams from her detail in the Dining Room where she had been set at a task of scrubbing. She immediately searched for her and found her alone by the door in the basement of the Dining Hall. Other girls in the detail reported to her that George Horn, a Piegan Indian boy of the Blackfeet Indian reservation and a kitchen boy had been with her there but had run out before the Dining Room matron had arrived.

The girl admitted to Mrs. Ewing that she had improper relationship with the boy. She also admitted that prior to coming to this school she had frequently had improper relationship with boys. George Horn first denied the charge and then admitted that he had met her, the girl, under the conditions mentioned as well as two other times at the same place and time.

Since Emma arrived at the school last September, she has borne an excellent reputation and was not considered a bad girl at all. George likewise has borne a good reputation.

I am advising you fully of all of the facts so that if deemed advisable, arrangements may be made for the boy to marry the girl. They are both, however, quite young, she being 15 years of age and he 19 years of age.

A few days ago you wired me that Emma Williams would leave Carlyle monday evening of this week. Your telegram does not contain information as to the reason for her return home and we do not know whether it is on account of illness or for other reasons. When transmitting this information to the parents of the girl, so that they could come into town and meet her they naturally passed through several days of anxiety as to the girls condition.

I hope that you will keep this thought in mind and should you, in the future find it necessary to notify us by wire of the return home of any pupil you will advise us as to the health of the pupil, so as to prevent unnecessary anxiety.
