INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other non-reservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.

Dear Miss Johnston:-

We sent Rachel Cabay to Mrs. Passmore this morning under protest. She absolutely refused to go last evening and told Mrs. Ewing that she had told you she would not go to this place. She said Nancy Peters did not like it there and Mamie Green said, "the place was away out in the woods".

Not knowing the home well and not knowing what had happened between you and Rachel, it was a little hard to know just what to do. Finally Mrs. Ewing and I agreed to tell her to go as arranged so that Mrs. Passmore would not be disappointed and I would write you right away, tell you the circumstances and ask you to see her and if she was still dissatisfied, to find a town home for her. Mrs. Ewing as usual came to the rescue, and persuaded her to do this. She left at 5:25 this morning.

Now the thing for us to do is to keep our promise to her and she went out only upon the conditions named. So, will you see her and do the best you can for her. She was a very unhappy girl for a time. We thought it better to do this than to have her way after she had signed to go. The girls watch such things so closely.

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Dear Mr. Francis:-

To-day I took Rachael Coby from Mrs. Delaney's home during her absence and sent her to Carlisle. I took this immediate action for the reasons as here given:-

Mrs. Delaney evidently does not consider Carlisle's wishes and frequently shifts her Carlisle obligations either on to a neighbor or another patron.

To explain more fully: - On Thursday of this week while investigating the calls of the Indian boys as reported to you I felt it wise also to caution the patrons against leaving their girls frequently alone during the day considering the fact that a soldiers' camp had been established in this vicinity.

Mrs. Delaney told me she had been in the habit of leaving her girl frequently for week end trips. Rachael has been in the charge of the next door neighbor. After her short house hold duties were finished her time was her own to do as she pleased. It is fortunate for all concerned that Rachael did not take advantage of so much time on her hands with her country mother

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away so frequently to cause more serious trouble. In the evenings Rachael was expected to report to the next-door neighbor to sleep in her home.

I told Mrs. Delaney the responsibility rested with her not with her neighbor - that unless a patron ~~is~~ not willing to put up with the disadvantages for the sake of the advantages, then she should not take her ask for an Indian girl. We talked the matter over and I said emphatically that especially now considering the unsettled times her girl should not be left alone so much of the time even during the day and further Mr. Francis would certainly not approve of it.

After this discussion I could scarcely believe that any patron knowing her responsibility would deliberately so disregard your wishes. Imagine my surprise when I called this morning to find Mrs. Delaney had left on Friday for another week-end trip to be back sometime on Sunday, Rachael alone but this time she was to spend her nights with Mrs. Farrow - a patron on another street.

I took Hattie Tarbell to Mrs. Delaney's this morning to have some statements cleared up in the presence of Mrs. Delaney and Rachael. These statements Hattie made to me on Friday and she said Rachael had told her of meeting a soldier at Willow Grove of a ride with him through the "Coal Mine" and of a call he made her at her home during Mrs. Delaney's absence.

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Vera Attanick and Gertrude Pego were also called to the conference and as a result of this conference I did learn that Rachael had met a soldier at Willow Grove, that he had asked her to go for a ride thru to the "Coal Mine" and she accepted but that he did not call on her at her home nor anywhere else. However, there was plenty of opportunity had the girl been so inclined - Rachael says she told Hattie for a joke that the soldier called on her while Mrs. Delaney was away. I feel reasonably sure that Rachael is telling the truth. Her country record has always been good.

I do not feel that I was too hasty in making this decision to remove Rachael this morning during Mrs. Delaney's absence but I do feel sorry that it was necessary to take so severe a measure to prove to Mrs. Delaney that your wishes when it comes to the interests of these girls must be respected.

I am not sending Rachael in for punishment either but she should receive further caution and reproof for accepting attentions from strangers.
