INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

Dear Madam:

Telegram received on my return to the office. I most certainly regret that there has been this misunderstanding in the matter of our pupil, Bessie, as it was impossible for me to comply with your request on account of being away from home and out of reach today.

We presumed that the father had the privilege of assigning his daughter when her term at the school was fulfilled, and acting on this presumption, we, of course, took it for granted that she was to remain with us and that there would be no question as to her remaining with us.

Bessie herself asserts the same, saying that she had only signed for five years and since this time was up she was free, and did not have to return to the school as she had a mother's care with every privilege of education, which even the school could not give her.

Enroute (Stenographer did not finish letter before train time)
I am indeed very sorry that these conditions have arisen. ~~He acted entirely on the above presumption when Mrs. took her on the family's vacation trip~~
~~I trust you have had a definite word from her father by this time as I wrote to him when he requested Mrs. Dimmet to keep Bessie that he arrange this definitely with the school as the school has always treated us so kindly that we did not want even a cause for an issue which now confronts us. On account of the strenuous work for last 1 1/2 yrs I must have a little rest. Unless anything unforeseen happens I shall communicate~~

Had your request to have your daughter Bessie remain with Mrs. Theodore Dimmick of Oak Lane, come through this office in good time, much anxiety on the part of Bessie and Mrs. Dimmick and annoyance on our part, could have been avoided. Mrs. Shuster complied with instructions and I have sent Olive to Haskell. Mrs. Dimmick has Bessie in her home yet and says she will keep her. I will note your request to have her remain there and will drop the matter of her transfer to Haskell.

Nettie is still at Toledo, Iowa, in the Sanatorium.
