SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them are living, and if neither of them are living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, That hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case; but in all cases where the parents are living they should first be consulted.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations or Indian schools to nonreservation schools.

My Dear Mr. Francis:

I am enclosing herewith a letter from Dana Black, a Cheyenne Indian from this reservation, in which he makes the modest request that I send him \$3000.00, I do not know whether he means \$3.00, \$300.00 or \$3000.00, but it does not make very much difference inasmuch as Earnie has been given the limit under the ^{regulations} ~~legislation~~ for one year, however, if in your judgment there is any urgent necessity for sending him more, I will be glad to give your recommendation prompt action.

I am also enclosing a letter to Dana, which I will ask you to deliver after reading. You of course understand that a Cheyenne's besetting sin is money, they will do anything for it. Money, sell their teeth for money, not that they have any special need for it, just to get it. One of the hardest battles we have to fight is to break up that abnormal craze for money.

My dear Mr. Francis:

Replying to your letter of April 22, 1918, relative to a letter from Ernie Black, uncle of Dana Black, requesting that his son be granted permission to return home during the summer, I beg to say that Ernie Black is one of the most disreputable men in this vicinity and is now under indictment in the United States Court for furnishing liquor to Indians, also under indictment in the same court, together with Ex-County Judge and Ex-Superintendent of this reservation for conspiracy to rob the Indians of their land. The probabilities are that he will go to the penitentiary. These cases come up on the 22nd and 29th of next month for trial, and we are very hopeful of landing the whole crowd behind the bars.

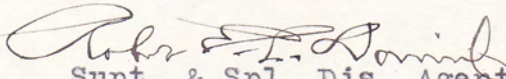
I agree with you fully in the opinion that it would be very unwise for Dana to return this summer to the reservation. I am fully satisfied that it would be the undoing of the good start he has made and I trust that you will not allow him to return.

With reference to the money for Dana I shall transfer

to your jurisdiction, immediately upon receipt of necessary authority, funds from his account to be used as you may see fit, in fact, I had intended doing this sooner, but we are so crowded because of War conditions that, like many others, we cannot always do things as promptly as we would like.

Sir:

I have the honor to invite your attention to the case of Dana Black, a student of this school from the Cantonment Agency, Oklahoma. Dana has been at this school for one year and has expended approximately \$98. of a Hundred Dollars placed to his credit by Superintendent Daniels.

Superintendent Daniels advises me that Dana has plenty of money to his credit and in the past has been somewhat of a spender.

It will be seen that he has been held down to the regulation amount for nearly a year. He now is in a position, however, where he has practically no money left and he wishes to have his Superintendent transfer him some more here.

In view of the circumstances of this particular case and the fact that this boy is evidently learning to conserve his funds and to avoid holding down on him too hard, I recommend that Superintendent Daniels be authorized to transfer me Fifty Dollars to carry Dana Black until the end of the year.

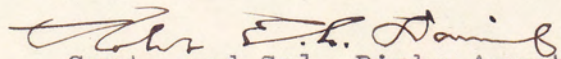

My Dear Mr. Francis:

Replying to your letter dated March 5, 1918 relative to transfer of funds to your school for Dana Black. I beg to advise that Dana, has already received the limit of funds under the regulation, for one year. He has plenty of funds to his credit, and I have no objection, whatever, to his having more, except that the regulations place the limit. If you think it advisable, I will transfer \$100.00 or \$200.00 to you to be disbursed by you, but I am afraid that it will cause you trouble, for the reason, that under the regulations, it would not make any difference whether I paid it out or whether you paid it out, some body would be held responsible if we exceeded the limit. It is possible you might get authority from Washington, and if you wish to try it, let me know and I will be glad to transfer to you, whatever, amount you suggest.

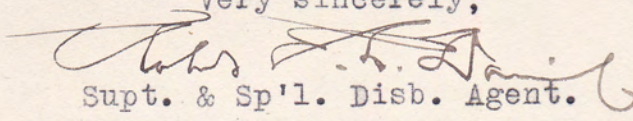
Dana is quite a spender, in fact, has no idea of the value of money, but the Cheyenne children, both those at home and who are attending non-reservation schools, have made such commendable records this year, that I am inclined
