SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Sir:

In letter of even date I have reported the case of Turner Dwight now in the guard house of this institution charged with obtaining a drink of liquor from some person whose name he says he does not know but of whom he has given a description.

The case has been placed in the hands of Mr. Corbett, the night watchman of this institution, who holds a commission as special officer, and an earnest effort will be made to locate the person guilty of the offense.

In this connection, with the warm weather of spring the boys can get out more in spare moments and are naturally subject to temptation from boot-leggers.

While it is not believed that liquor conditions are at all bad in Carlisle if a special officer is conveniently located so that he could run in here at an early date and capture or frighten off boot-leggers, it would be a most excellent thing.

Sir:

I have the honor to report that last night Turner Dwight, 18 years of age, a Choctaw Indian from Oklahoma, and a student of this school, left the school grounds without authority to purchase cigarets and obtained a drink of liquor from some person whose name he says he does not know but of whom he has given a description.

Turner Dwight was caught on his return to the school grounds by the disciplinarian who was following him up by reason of his absence from quarters during study hour without authority. While he was not intoxicated the disciplinarian smelt liquor upon his breath, he admitted the charge of having used liquor, was arrested by the disciplinarian and placed in the guard house where he now remains.

This is not Turner's first offense. On January first he was found guilty of the same offense and at that time he was given another chance by Mr. Lipps. I am advised that it was agreed that a repetition of the offense would mean his immediate dismissal from

school.

In view of these facts I feel that the discipline of the school demands that Turner be sent home at once and I request immediate authority to take this action. In the meantime I shall require him to remain in the guard house.

I understand that Mr. Lipps was given special authority when endeavoring to upbuild the tone of the school to return students to their home without authority and without reference to the office. I am doubtful of my authority to act similarly but it is very important for the maintenance of the discipline of this school that matters of this kind should be acted upon immediately.

It will be noted that I have not recommended that this lad should be expelled. He is only 18 years of age and a year at home may make him appreciate educational advantages. Please consult Mr. Lipps in regard to the case as he is familiar with all of the facts.

The matter of the liquor will be the subject of another communication.




