Dear Sir:

Paul Red Star and Alex Iron Whiteman, two pupils of this school from your jurisdiction, deserted last Thursday night and I have information from one of their school mates here that both left for their home.

This same boy tells me that Paul received a check for \$50 from Pine Ridge Agency. Will you please let me know if this is so and why the check was not sent through the Superintendent of this school. If you will refer to Mr. Francis' letter dated May 29, 1917, you will note that he asked that any money sent to Paul should be by check made payable to him as Superintendent.

Both these boys enrolled last fall for a term of three years and are therefore not eligible for enrollment at any other school. I wish you would take what steps you can to have them returned to the school to complete their term.

AGREEMENT between Paul Redstar and
Carlisle Indian School.

1st. It seems quite important that the Ford Motor Co. employ only such Indians as are recommended by the Indian School, because the class of boys which are roaming about and seeking positions are not of the desirable kind, and their entrance into this Institution would bring them into close touch with the Carlisle boys, and have a tendency to drag them down and to ruin. There are many Indian youths living upon the various reservations, who are living leisure lives, and have no definite purpose in view. They, of course, hear about our boys making good at your factory, and they take it upon themselves to gain entrance. It is very obvious that their entrance into the factory would be detrimental to all concerned. We want a clean institution, in which to place our Carlisle.

2nd. It is quite important too that the school be careful to recommend only boys of good school record, including their ability and moral character. The Ford factory is not equipped with a regular disciplinarian staff, and therefore, could not control those who are inclined to be unruly. Boys who enter this factory must be a disciplinarian unto themselves, and a boy who has acted the truant in school, could not be put upon his honor.

3rd. It is quite necessary also that the Ford Motor Co. suspend or expell boys of ill repute, in order that we keep a clean industrial supply of boys. Those who have weaker characters will go from bad to worse and drag down those who otherwise would make good. In mild cases, it would be advisable to report the matter to the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian Industrial School, suspending the boy at fault, until some disposition of him is afforded by the Superintendent. It might be well to recall him to school for discipline, placing a more desirable boy in his position, or it might be well to reprimand him, whereas in severe cases he should be expelled at once, however, his wages should be retained in order to meet any debts that might appear. A letter to the school reporting the difficulty will be answered and attended to at once.

4th. Indian youths have not the knowledge of spending money in legitimate ways, therefore, it seems necessary that they be guided in their savings. Boys who are on the probation list will need 75% of their earnings to meet

their living expenses, but those who have become shareholders can get along well with 50%.

5th. It is not the purpose of the Indian School to hamper the Indian boys in any way in any investments which they see fit to make, and a part, or the whole amount shall be sent to the Indian depositor upon satisfactory proof of legitimate needs. In all cases where an Indian boy desires to withdraw his savings, he should make request to the Motor Co., and by their recommendation, such amount as he shall ask shall be forwarded.

6th. It is not the intention of the Government to withdraw these Indian boys at any time, in order that they may be transported to their reservations, but it is the aim of the Government that they shall build for themselves a career.

I hereby concur in and agree to adhere to all of the foregoing to the best of my ability.
