If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer. $f^{6-370}$

## United States Indian School

AGREEMENTI betwèen CARLISLE. PA. Carlisle Indian School.

Ist. It seems quite importent that the Ford Motor Co. employ only such Indions as are recommended by the Indien School, because the class of boys which are roaming about and secking positions are not of the desirable kind, and their entrance into this Institrition would bring them into clcse touch with the Carlisle boys, and have a tendency to drag them down and to ruin. There are many Indian youths living upon the various reservations, who are living leisure lives, and have no definite purpose in view. They, of course, hear about our boys making good a.t your factory, and they take it upon thenselves to gain entrance. It is very obvious that their entrance into the factory would be detrimental to all concerned. We want a clean institution, in which to place our Carlisle.

2nd. It is quite important too that the school be careful to recommend only boys of good school record, including their ability d moral character. The ford factory is not equipped with a regular disciplinarian staff, and therefore, could not control those who are inclined to be unruly. Boys who enter this factory must be a disciplinarian unto themselves, and a boy who has acted the truant in school, could not be put upon his honor.

3rd. It is quite necessary also that the ford Motor Co. suspend or expell boys of ill repute, in order that we keep a clean industrial supply of boys. Those who have weaker characters will go from bad to worse and drag down those who otherwise would make good. In mild cases, it would be advisable to report the matter to the Superintendent of the Carlisle Indian Industrial School, suspending the boy at fault, until some disposition of him is afforded by the superintendent. It might be well to recall him to school for discipline, placing a more desirable boy in his position, or it might be well to reprimand him, whereas in severe cases he should be expelled at once, however, his wages should be retained in order to meet any debts that might appear. A letter to the school reporting the difficulty will be answered and attended to at once.

4 th, Indan youths have not the knowledge of spending money in legitimate ways, therefore, it seems necessary that they be guided in their savings. Boys who are on the probation list will need $75 \%$ of their earnings to meet

their living expenses, but those who have become shareholders can get along well with $50 \%$.

5th. It is not the purpose of the Indian School to hamper the Indian boys in any way in any investments which they see fit to make, and a part, or the whole amount shall be sent to the Indian depositor upon satisfactory proof of legitimate needs. In all cases where an Indian boy desires to withdraw his savings, he should make request to the Motor Co., and by their recommendation, such anount as he shall ask shall be forwarded.

6th. It is not the intention of the Governnent to withdraw these Indian boys at any tine, in order that they may be transported to their reservations, but it is the aim of the Government that they shall build for themselves a career.
to all of the foregoing to the best of my ability.
