Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

### INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that-

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.







Dear Louise:-

I have Miss Johnston's report of her visit to you. She sends me your spelling test for Jamuary and I am very glad to know that you have made such a good mark, one of the best in the class Miss Johnston writes. This would be a good item for the Arrow and I would put it in Louise, if it was not for the fact that your report in other ways is so discouraging. We do not any of us know what to do with a big girl like you who has no ambition to do what she ought to do. If you were a little girl and should say, "I should worry" when you were corrected for not doing the right thing, we would know what to do to spur you up but you are a great big girl or rather woman, 19 years old and we cannot discipline you like a child. I should think you would be ashamed to act like a child when you are really a woman.

You have every chance where you are to learn what Mr. Lipps wants the Oklahoma girls to learn especially, that is to keep house, learn to take care of property and to learn to keep yourself neat and clean. With Mrs. Robinson, you also have the opertunity of learning how to care for little children. Yet with all these advantages, you show no interest and go around doing your work in a "don't care" sort of way. If you are acting in this way so that you

may be returned to Carlisle, you are making a sad mistake. Our girls here just new are working hard and trying to make their grades in school and in their vecational work and they do not want any lazy, indifferent girls like you here. You will have to "make good" under t the outing before we can allow you to return to Carlisle. You went out this fall of your own accord and with the understanding that you would remain all winter and this you will have to do.

Now Louise, I dislike very much to have to scold you in this way, especially by letter and I hope neither Mr. Lipps or I will have to ever write you such a letter again. This depends entirely upon yourself. I am going to ask Mrs. Robinson to make me a report about you, a month from today and I want you to make this report very different from the one I received from Miss Johnston this morning.
