SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a non-reservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the Agency records. The agent will then send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

NOTE.—Age limits, fourteen to twenty years. Preferably fourteen to eighteen. Students must be at least one-fourth Indian, preferably full Indian. Special cases beyond the age limit will be given consideration. An industrial course only can be taken and the term reduced to three years, in exceptional cases.

INDORSEMENTS.

The laws relating to the transfer of Indian children from reservations and schools are as follows:

That hereafter no Indian child shall be sent from any Indian reservation to a school beyond the State or Territory in which said reservation is situated without the voluntary consent of the father or mother of such child if either of them is living, and if neither of them is living without the voluntary consent of the next of kin of such child. Such consent shall be made before the agent of the reservation, and he shall send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate that such consent has been voluntarily given before such child shall be removed from such reservation. And it shall be unlawful for any Indian agent or other employee of the Government to induce, or seek to induce, by withholding rations or by other improper means, the parents or next of kin of any Indian to consent to the removal of any Indian child beyond the limits of any reservation. (28 Stats., p. 906.)

Provided, that hereafter no Indian child shall be taken from any school in any State or Territory to a school in any other State against its will or without the written consent of its parents. (29 Stats., p. 348.)

The rules provide that—

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

An Indian boy or girl 18 years old and over may, without the consent of parents or others, personally sign the application form on its being changed to suit the case.

This form is to be used only in transfers from reservations, or Indian schools, to nonreservation schools.

Your letter and the package containing a pair of moccasins were sent to Mr. Francis, now Lieut. Francis, at Fort Niagara, New York. You may have heard from him before this letter reaches you, but I do not know that he will tell you anything about the changes which are to take place at Carlisle this year.

Our school will be closed the last of this month and the buildings turned over to the War Department for war purposes. I am very sorry that this will prevent your return with a party. I am anxious, however, that you continue your school work, and would suggest that you enroll now at one of the otherlarge Western schools, either Chemawa, or Chilocco might be preferable as you have already served a term at Haskell, or perhaps you might want to return there and complete the cours which you began. Whatever you do, do not give up school yet.

Dear Friend;

I thought I would write to you this evening as I'm in town. I came down from the ranch where we are putting up hay. During the past two weeks we put up 250 tons of hay and still have about 400 tons of hay to put up. Men are very hard to get so it makes working very slow. There is only

four men helping me with
my folks hay. I am
expecting William Kennedy
to come over. He wrote me
a letter the other day
asking if he could get
work here, and I wired
him to come immediately
if he wanted to work.

I sent a pair of
moccasins by mail and
expect you received them
by this time.

The Crows have a
very good prospect of some
grain as I see that a
few have some good looking
grain.

The Lodge Grass district appears to be the sugar beet district of the Crow Reservation. Sheridan Wyoming, a neighboring city, is the sugar beet center and they furnish the men to work these sugar beet farms.

I am expecting to take a good bunch of Crows back with me this fall to Carlisle and will you would send over Agent, Mr. Asbury at Crow Agency, thanks of application, and a good forcible letter that you

it to see more Crows
own there to Carlisle,
I'll recruit for you
after the laying and
harvesting is done. I
hope it gives me a
day to secure sufficient
numbers to at least
represent the Crows, that
have been there in the
previous years. It seems
they are afraid to go
to Carlisle, because of
the rate of death, which
Carlisle was in her
younger days.

I havent met any of
the Carlisle's return

Students of late years
but there are few of
her early day students
and they are the leading
principals of the tribe.

If a few more go off
to school, maybe we
can finally get some
where on the road towards
prosperity.

I am going back to
the ranch in the morning
for I came down for
provisions and repairs
and if I stay in town,
very long, the probabilities
are, that my men will
quit me.

Hoping that I find
time again to write to
you and surely to my
friend Mr. Shambaugh
I will close for this
time.




