My dear Lenora,-

I have Miss Johnston's report of her visit to you and note that your report is not up to what it has been in the past. I do not want you to think there is anything against your conduct and work. There is no complaint about that. The trouble is your failure to do your duty to yourself. I will explain what I mean.

You had a hard winter here and you were not in the best of health when you went out. The doctor here reported this so we knew it but we sent you out because we thought the change of feed and the chance to get out in the country would be good for you. We have done our part in getting you into a good home, now you want to help yourself.

When you have finished your work, instead of going to your room to lounge about, stay down-stairs and get out into the fresh air. We have beautiful weather now, cool and comfortable, and you ought to make the best use you can of it. If there are any children in the family, get out and romp with them. Breathe deep and get all the fresh air possible into your lungs. If you do this, you will soon lose your cough.

You are one of our girls who must earn her own living when you are through here. You do well in school and it may be you will choose teaching as a profession! You will make no kind of a teacher if you are in poor health. You want to think of this, my girl, and brace up. Do all you can to improve your health. You will be much happier if you will take this advice. Try it and see!

Dear M. C. J. Peel: -

Doubtless you will recall that Lenora Logan was in a rather un-
sound condition this spring. She had a cough when she came to Mrs. Nurty
and is still coughing though there is improvement. She has gained $2\frac{1}{4}$
pounds in three weeks and says she feels better.

Lenora is a listless indifferent girl - does not like housework and
takes little interest. Even in good health in Mrs. Cora's home at Glenorch
she was very poor in her application to work in the home.

Mrs. Nurty says she thinks Lenora does not get enough air - says
there is no reason for her to spend any time in her room other than
to keep it in order and sleep there, yet she persists in going to her
room - third floor - as soon as she can every day and remains there.
Mrs. Nurty would rather have her down on the lawn or porch. We talked
these matters over but I think a letter from head quarters at you can-
remove would make her think. Lenora will have to earn her own
living - perhaps in the teaching line - for she is bright in the academic
work but she will have no health if she does not soon make
up somewhat.

Dear Friend:

I have your letter of October twenty-fourth in which you ask why it is that we charge 25¢ per lesson for music lessons at Carlisle, in which I have to advise that in all schools piano lessons are extra. We are charging about one-half the usual price charged in other schools. Don't you think that if the Government boards and clothes your children that you might contribute just a little toward their education? Our Indian schools are vocational schools and we do not make a specialty of music although we do provide instruction for a limited number. We make no charge for vocal music or for instruction in the band. If you desire your daughter to take piano lessons, we will try and make the arrangement for her to do so, provided you are willing to pay 25¢ for each lesson and provided also there is room for her in the piano class.
