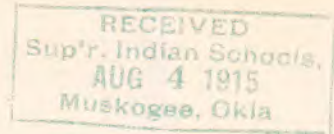

SPECIAL NOTE.

This form must be executed in duplicate when a child is transferred from a reservation to a nonreservation school. The Superintendent of the nonreservation school will retain the original for his files, and the duplicate shall be deposited in the reservation school records. The reservation superintendent should send to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs his certificate as provided by law. All the blanks must be properly filled in every case.

If the information called for on any part of the blank is not known, that fact should be stated. No space should be left unfilled. Whether the parents are living or dead, their names must be given.

The person who signs the blank as consenting to the transfer should indicate his relation to the applicant by marking out the word "parent," "guardian," or "next of kin," leaving unmarked only the title appropriate to the signer.

The enrollment of Indian pupils in nonreservation schools is governed by the "Rules for the Indian Service, 1913," sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 18, 19, 36, 112, 113, 114, 117, 118, 124 (b).

The Rules should be consulted before filling out the application blanks.

Dear Dr. Irvine :

I am very glad to submit the following report on Enus Wilson's work in Reading. At the beginning of the year Enus was able to read aloud two words, -"the" and "to" . He seemed to get ideas from many simple printed words, but was unable either to pronounce these words aloud or to associate concrete things with the words expressed. It was thus necessary to start at the very beginning. I have been trying first of all to teach him the sounds of our language, which he finds great difficulty in uttering correctly on account of certain peculiarities of his Indian speech; then I have been trying to teach him to group these sounds into simple words; and lastly to associate these words with things . He has been coming to class with older boys, and by listening to them read , by pronouncing words after me, and by reading simple phrases himself, he is developing gradually the ability to read.

Enus is always cloaked with Indian reserve and bashfulness, but at the same time is always interested , attentive, and ambitious to a remarkable degree. Teaching him to read is of necessity very slow work, but his progress is remarkable. Although unable to read simple things at present, Enus has respect and esteem for his reading book, and I think, the capacity and desire to improve rapidly.

Dear Mr. Wyly:

Mr. E. T. Noble arrived here last evening with Enus Wilson and has been assured that the boy will be kept here until it can be learned whether there is any school in the East that could accomodate so young a boy and one who has completed so little academic work. If he cannot be located in any such school and the Office at Washington would not grant authority to keep the boy in school here he will have to be returned to Oklahoma with Mr. Noble at the termination of the latter's vacation period.

The Indian School Rules forbid the transfer of any child less than fourteen years of age unless accompanied by an older child from the same family and then only by special authority from the Commissioner's office. In this case, however, the Government is put to so little expense that there should not be any difficulty about having the Rules waived if the boy can be placed in some other school than Carlisle or it is learned later that sufficient academic work has been completed to justify keeping him here.

If the lad is kept in school here it seems only fair to recommend to the Office that authority be granted for his enrolment upon condition that an amount of \$200.00 per year is paid for his tuition.

When Superintendent Lipps wrote to you as he did on June 15th of this year relative to placing Five Tribes' pupils who are financially able into schools with white boys and girls he cannot have had in mind any students not eligible for enrolment here in so far as age and minimum academic attainment are concerned. It is respectfully requested, therefore, that before any other students of any class whatsoever are given permission to come to Carlisle there be submitted here full information regarding the applicants it is desired to have accommodated.

You will be advised further if anything at all can be done for the boy in whom Mr. Noble is interested.

Dear Mr. DeHuff:

This will introduce Mr. E. T. Noble of the firm of Moore and Noble, Attorneys at Law of Okmulgee, Oklahoma. Mr. Noble is visiting Carlisle and has in his charge Enus Wilson, a full blood Creek minor, Roll No. 1218 New Born, and represents Mr. Ed Hart, the guardian of the minor, who has made application for the enrollment of his ward at your school. The records here disclose the fact that Enus was born May 16, 1902, and on account of his being under 14 years of age the application for his enrollment has not been approved.

In his letter of June 15, 1915 Superintendent Lipps stated he thought it would be a good plan to send to selected white schools in your section of the country, all five tribes pupils who are financially able to bear their own expenses. This minor has to

his credit at the Agency here, about \$15,000 and I am informed has other vaulable property. I have suggested to Mr. Noble that in the event you could not enroll Enus on account of his being under age, you might carry his name on your records and place him in some good school near Carlisle as he has plenty of money to meet these expenses. However should you determine to enroll him as a regular pupil, in view of the fact that he will soon be of the required age, I shall be glad to approve his application for enrollment.

Mr. Noble is well recommended and I am sure you may rely upon any representations made by him in this matter and any courtesies shown him will be duly appreciated.

My dear Dr. Irvine:

A few days ago, the attorney for the guardian of an Indian boy by the name of Enos Wilson came here and left the lad with us, requesting that we make some arrangement for his schooling.

The boy will not be fourteen years old until next May, and consequently we could not admit him regularly to this school. He is also a little low in academic attainments, apparently having finished only the first three years of the work in the primary course. He has ample funds with which to pay his tuition wherever he might be located, and the particular desire of his guardian is that the boy be placed in some school in the East where he can have an opportunity for securing a liberal education. The boy is a full blooded Creek and seems to have been properly reared thus far. The guardian also states that it is their desire to get him away from untoward influences in Oklahoma for a time.

Would you be in a position to do anything for this boy? Would there be any way by which you could enroll him in your institution and place him under a tutor who might bring him up properly? If not, can you give us the name of any institution known to you in which this lad might be placed? We are anxious to comply with the desire of the guardian of this boy, and any information you may be able to give us will be very greatly appreciated.

I believe the boy is all right in every respect and that he would make good. Wherever he might be admitted, we should expect to carry his name on our rolls as an Outing pupil in order that we might assist the school authorities in matters requiring governmental supervision.

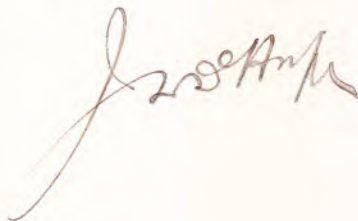

The little fellow was pretty homesick before dinner, but he has braced up considerably, especially since we handed him over to Louis Tyner, one of our Indian boys from Kansas. Louis is a descendant of Tecumseh. If you desire us to do so, we shall be glad to send you the records of the boy from time to time, so that you can see what he is doing in classroom work.

Enus impresses me very favorably at first sight. He is a young boy, and my heart goes out to him. Mrs. Irvine will also take a big personal interest to him.

I note what you say about advising you concerning the boy when he has need of funds. I will instruct our Treasurer, Mr. Drumm to keep this in mind. Mr. Drumm is in position to handle funds for the boy in the way of spending money; also money for supplies. He does this for a goodly number of boys in our school each year. You might send him a check for \$25 or \$50 on account, to be used for supplies for Enus. He will need some bedclothing immediately. My dear Mr. Huff:-

In your letter of October 13th addressed to Dr. Irvine you inquire in regard to whether or not it would be convenient for us to handle money for Enus Wilson and I understand that Dr. Irvine replied to your letter, telling you what is our system here at Mercersburg and explained the manner in which accounts of this kind are carried.

It seems that Enus Wilson arrived here in Mercersburg without a cent of money in his possession. He has been getting along since his arrival here without any money whatever for any purpose. In addition to this, he did not have any bed clothing at all for use on his bed and up to this time he has been using bed clothing belonging to one of the other Indian boys. It is really important that Enus should be fitted up with a full equipment of bed clothing, etc., and he ought to have a little money on hand with which to pay for a few other incidental expenses which will come along from time to time. I am writing, therefore, to ask for information in regard to where his funds are to come from.

His entrance application is signed by Ed. Hart, Guardian, but your letter leads me to think that possibly you have some other way to arrange the matter for him. I will be glad to receive any information which you can give me in regard to the boy and if it is possible, within the next few days, to have a deposit of, say, \$25.00 or \$30.00 placed to his credit, I will

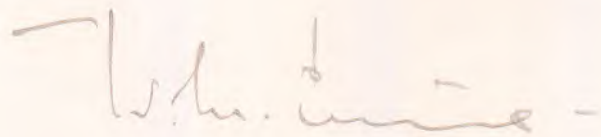

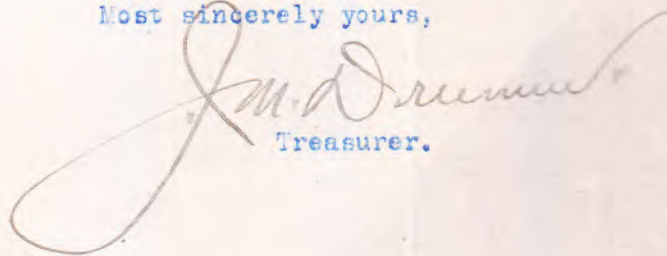

Your kind letter of recent date has been received, and I have read the same with much care. I note the fact that Enos Wilson is an Indian boy of fourteen years of age, and that he has finished only about three years in the primary course. He has evidently lost a great deal of time, and what he needs is much personal attention to carry him over the elements thoroughly and rapidly. Each year we have enrolled at Mercersburg a number of boys who range from twelve to fourteen years of age. Some of these fellows are very deficient in their education, and in our organization we have an arrangement whereby we can carry these younger boys forward rapidly and thoroughly. One of our instructors gives all of his time to these few younger boys, not only hearing them recite, but also teaching them how to work. We should be very glad indeed to receive Enos Wilson, and we believe we could do something for him. He needs to make up the lost time as quickly as possible. Each year we have a number of boys coming to us from Latin-American countries. They do not understand English, and we have to form special classes for these fellows in Reading, Spelling, Writing, etc. We can do the same for Enos Wilson, and we hope that you will decide to send him to us. I herewith enclose application blank. Won't you have somebody in authority fill out the same and return with room deposit? If we find that we cannot carry the boy along in the way that he ought to go, we shall be glad to say so frankly and to charge him tuition for only the length of time he is with us. I want to be perfectly fair with the boy, and we are anxious to help him to the fullest extent of our ability.

I am sorry that your boy White was not able to accept one of the Wanamaker Scholarships. We have selected two new Indian boys; one from the Snoqualamie Tribe in Washington and one from the Shawnee Tribe in Kansas.

My dear Mr. Lipps:

We have not yet heard from you about the return of your ward, Ehus Wilson, to Mercersburg this fall. We are writing a copy of this letter to the parents who have not yet sent room deposits for the coming year. Naturally we prefer to enroll our old boys. They know the traditions and spirit of the school and we can generally do more for an old boy than we can for a new boy.

Notwithstanding the war conditions our enrollment at this time is one of the best in the history of the school. Laucks Hall is completely filled and only a few vacancies are left in South Cottage. There are good vacancies here and there in the other dormitories but at the present rate of enrollment these will be taken before long. Not infrequently it happens that old boys who wait until near the opening of the school to make a decision are keenly disappointed on account of the location of their room. I am, therefore, writing this note of warning.

You will be interested to hear that in spite of the excitement which came to all schools and colleges by the outbreak of the war our boys did unusually fine work in the examinations of the College Entrance Board which were taken by approximately eighty Mercersburg boys in the third week in June. In the Department of History the record of examinations passed was 100%; in Elementary Algebra Complete, 100%; in Advanced or College Algebra, 100%; in Trigonometry, 91%; in Plane Geometry 93%. In English more than fifteen thousand papers were read by the College Board authorities. Approximately only eighteen per cent. of all papers received a passing grade. More than eighty per cent. of the Mercersburg English papers passed. Had we not permitted four boys to try the English examinations who were not able to pass our own English Examinations, the Mercersburg English record with the College Board would have been ninety-two per cent. passed.

I hope that you are planning to send your ward, Ehus Wilson, back to us and that you will let us hear from you soon. With all good wishes to the members of your family, believe me,

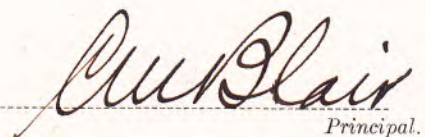
